## Dry Creek project proceeding

Wood County is accepting letters of interest from engineering firms for consulting and environmental design services for an ecological improvement project along a section of Dry Creek.

The county commissioners last month approved a resolution authorizing the county engineer to advertise for the letters.

In 2018, the engineer's office began working with the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency and state and federal offices to identify potential projects that will improve habitat in the Maumee Area of Concern. An undeveloped, 34.2-acre parcel in the Village of Walbridge that abuts Dry Creek has been selected. The parcel sits along Walbridge Road east of East Broadway.

The U.S.-Canada Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement defines Areas of Concern as "geographical areas designated by the parties where significant impairment of beneficial uses has occurred as a result of human activities at the local level."

The Maumee Area of Concern covers about 787 square miles, including several watersheds draining to Lake Erie, making it one of the largest AOCs in the U.S.

Originally, the Maumee AOC was identified as the area extending from the City of Bowling Green water intake along the Maumee River downstream to the Maumee Bay. The area included seven watersheds: Ten Mile Creek, Swan Creek, Grassy Creek, Duck Creek, Otter Creek, Cedar Creek, and Crane Creek.

In 1992, the area was extended to the east to include Turtle Creek, Packer Creek and the Toussaint River.

Kevin Laughlin, geographic information system coordinator at the county engineer's office, said the Walbridge site qualified for non-competitive

## Oak Harbor, Port Clinton Arts corridor gets boost from state funds

Just a couple months or so ago, Oak Harbor Mayor Quinton Babcock was putting the finishing touches on an application for funding from the state for projects in a proposed arts district corridor between the village and City of Port Clinton.

Last week he received the answer he was hoping for when the appropriations for the state capital budget were announced.

The total appropriation for Ottawa County is \$575,000, including \$100,000 for Portage Riverwalk arts infrastructure in Oak Harbor and \$275,000 for the riverfront project in the village.

Another \$100,000 each was appropriated for the renovation of the historic Hoover Auditorium in Lakeside and the Arts Garage in Port Clinton.

The waterfront project tops a list of proposed improvements in the village that are included in the Oak Harbor Development Group's community master plan.

Planners in the Oak Harbor Devel-

opment Group, a 501c3 organization, envision an ADA-accessible walkway along the river, an amphitheater, shelter house and floating docks in the group's plan.

Last December, Port Clinton and Oak Harbor officials signed a memorandum of understanding to collaborate on establishing infrastructure that will improve access

to various arts, cultural, and entertainment venues.

The Greater Port Clinton Area Arts Council and the Oak Harbor Development Group partnered in the request for state funding.

"We're very excited," Mayor Babcock said last week. "We feel pretty confident the additional funds will put us in a position where we can complete the walk along the waterfront and shoreline protection. And once we engineer the amphitheater and have a good cost estimate, we may go ahead and put that \$100,000 to whatever preliminary work needs to be done."

Mayor Babcock said he and Port Clinton Mayor Mike Snider both want thriving downtowns and bustling small businesses and working opportunities for artists in Ottawa County.

The corridor, he said, is a big step to realizing that vision.

"The best way to achieve that is to work together. Part of how we're approaching this is through workforce development.

If you're graduating from Oak Harbor High School and you really would like to do art, you may want to go to art school or you may not. You may feel you have to move to Asheville, North Carolina, or Savannah, Georgia, or Denver, Colorado, or to Columbus to get those opportunities. So we really would like to create an opportunity where we have an infrastructure that can support you."

In 2021, the City of Port Clinton signed an agreement with the GPCAAC to lease its maintenance/storage garage - which had sat empty for about six years - to the arts council for \$1 a month.

Mayor Snider said the arts council is already sub-leasing space to about 22 artists and holding classes, seminars, and exhibits.

"It's going far better than originally planned," the mayor said.

One of the first exhibits at the garage featured the work of Associated Press photographer Eddie Adams, known for his 1968 image of a hand-cuffed Vietcong prisoner being shot in the head at point-blank range by a South Vietnam officer.

Mayor Snider said the state funds will bolster fundraising efforts already underway by the arts council.

"Their plans are incredible," he said, adding the arts council will organize performances at the amphitheater in Oak Harbor.

The capital budget was approved last week in both chambers of the legislature and awaits the governor's signature.

## Deadly driving season starting

The time from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend is referred to as the 100 Deadliest Days of Summer.

Last year, 400 fatal crashes killed 434 people during this time period. The 100 days only represent 27 percent of the cal-

endar year, but they account for more than one third of all fatal traffic crashes and deaths.

The 100 days also encompass the primary motorcycle riding months. Motorcycle crashes made up less than 3 percent of all crashes during this time frame, but made up about 32 percent of the fatal crashes.

Last year during the time frame, speeding citations of 20 mph or more over the speed limit accounted for 33,000 citations. More than 1,500 of those citations involved speeds of at least 100 mph.

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative funding through the U.S. EPA. A grant was awarded in 2021, enabling the planners to further develop the project concept.

“As it stands now, the project is two-fold. Firstly, we will make alterations to the banks of Dry Creek and stream itself, which will have beneficial impacts for wildlife,” he said, “Secondly, we will work in upland areas, which will consist of constructed wetlands or floodplain restoration. In addition, to clear habitat improvements, these restorations will also present co-benefits for water quality (nutrients and sediment) and water quantity (potential flooding abatement).”

Laughlin said the design phase will likely be completed by December.

“From there we anticipate implementation to begin in the spring of 2023 and last through 2024. Most of the work will be done by the end of the construction season 2023, but we are proposing native plantings, which require at least an additional year to ensure uptake and hardiness,” Laughlin said.

Walbridge mayor Ed Kolanko said the project will help alleviate flooding and drainage problems in the village.

“There is always water in Dry Creek and during heavy rains it’s not uncommon to see it up to the top with water,” he said. “Hats off to Kevin for finding some available grant opportunities that were out there to make this happen. From a conservation standpoint, it’s going to be widened a little and create a wetlands area. We may look at a park area after the project is completed.”

The site is now zoned for agricultural use.

The village has also purchased adjoining acreage and is keeping options open for possible commercial or residential development along Walbridge Road, the mayor said.

## Refuge Recycle Roundup June 11

Have outdated electronics or clothing items that are still usable or in rough shape? Take them to Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge’s Recycle Roundup on Saturday, June 11, from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., rain or shine.

Electronics items accepted include computers/servers, keyboards and mice, monitors/displays, cell phones, storage devices/flash drives, video game consoles, printers, scanners, memory/RAM, networking hardware, stereo equipment/speakers, and projectors (no TVs/ CRT monitors).

Textile items accepted include anything made from cloth or artificial fabric like vinyl. Nearly all textiles can be recycled, such as clothing (pants, jeans, skirts, dresses, suits, shorts, shirts, tees, tanks); outerwear (coats, jackets, gloves, hats, scarves); footwear (shoes, boots, heels, sneakers, sandals, socks, tights); undergarments (bras, underwear, slips, camisoles); accessories (hats, belts, ties, scarves, headbands); handbags (wallets, totes, luggage, backpacks, briefcases) and linens (towels, sheets, comforters, blankets, tablecloths). Textile items may be brought in garbage bags.

Those wishing to participate may recycle their items for \$10 per carload. Funds will help to support conservation efforts at Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge. Friends of Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge will receive cash per pound for recycled textiles.

Friends of Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge will be hosting the drop-off location with the help of Recycle I.T. USA Toledo LLC and Clothes Bin Ohio.

The refuge is located at 14000 W. SR 2, Oak Harbor. Look for the big green building off of Route 2. The Recycling Round Up will be held near the Visitor Center.

The Wildlife Drive will also be open on June 11. Visitors are welcome to take the seven-mile, one-way gravel road back through woodland, prairie and wetland habitats. The Wildlife Drive entrance is in the Visitor Center Parking Lot, and the drive is open from sunrise to sunset (weather permitting).

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**This week in Toledo's past:**

# Events in the Toledo area over the past 150 years

June 5-11

June 5

1859 - A surprise drop in temperature to 24 degrees kills many crops in their fields in Northwest Ohio.

1917 - Thousands of young men from Toledo are signing up for the draft as U.S. involvement in the European war looms large.

1922 - Home Furniture holds a big sale on baby carriages ranging in price from \$19.75 to \$59.75

1929 - Three firemen are injured in a spectacular blaze in East Toledo at the Kasco Mills along the riverfront.

1935 - A strike by Edison workers shuts down most of the city's power grid, idling factories, and closing many businesses in Toledo. Electric street cars are stopped and some radio station knocked off the air. The strike would go on for another week with intermittent outages.

June 6

1901 - The Elks Carnival in Findlay is under fire from local citizens for featuring a "cootchee cootchee" dance show. Church people have filed a formal petition with two judges calling it an immoral nuisance but the judges refused to intervene. The church people vow to tear down the tent and throw it into the Blanchard River.

1906 - In the wake of novelist Upton Sinclair's scandalous revelations contained in his novel, "The Jungle", Toledo Mayor Brand Whitlock orders health officers in the city to begin inspections of all Toledo meat packing facilities.

1921 - Trial gets underway in Toledo's Federal Court for members of the Joe Urbaytis gang, accused of robbing more than a million dollars in the Toledo Post Office heist in February.

1937 - The Toledo News Bee reports that about 100,000 people jammed the Toledo Municipal Airport in Lake Township for a major air show featuring a "bat wing" skydiver and other acrobatic stunt pilots.

1962 - Fremont Judge John Bronson makes national news for paddling young boys in his courtroom.

June 7

1905 - Barnum and Bailey Circus comes to town. After a rain delay, they hurriedly pitch the big tent at Hawley and Dorr Street to offer three rings of action, using three herds of elephants and over 500 horses.

1913 - An ice famine is underway in the city as ice handlers go on strike because employers refuse to bargain. Residents are now forced, under the threat of possible violence, to go to the ice house themselves to pick up their own blocks of ice.



1938 - Revelations surface that union "thugs" have been beating and attacking workers who don't want to join the union at the Pure Oil Refinery in Toledo, prompting official investigations.

1947 - Irwin Nolte and Lowell Overmyer say a torrent of small fish fell from the sky during a rainstorm and landed on the tarp of their truck parked at Walbridge and Woodville Roads. Experts say it was possible the minnows were picked up by a water spout in the lake and dropped them from the clouds.

1971 - A grisly find for Toledo Police as they are called to a West Toledo duplex and find four bodies, bound together. All had been killed in an execution style slaying in what police suspect was drug related. It remains unsolved.

1983 - The last Toledo City Council meeting is held in the Safety Building after almost 50 years. The councilors are moved to the new council chambers and offices in the newly built city-state office tower across Erie street.

June 8

1876 - The village of Pemberville is officially formed.

1902 - Residents at Miami and Brown Road say a band of gypsies camping in the area are causing big problems with noise and trouble making. In one case a man on a small horse rode into several saloons brandishing a pistol demanding drinks. Women in the neighborhood are said to be in near hysterics.

1903 - The Toledo Bee and the Toledo News merge to become the Toledo News Bee with a combined circulation of 44,000 subscribers.

1915 - A downtown drug store at Erie and Adams Street is raided by Toledo Police and the owner arrested after reports that the druggist had been making and selling illegal heroin tablets.

1929 - It's reported by the News Bee that future plans to build a new super highway on route of the Miami-Erie Canal (Anthony Wayne Trail) will mean future development in upriver areas of South Toledo.

1953 - Deadly tornadoes hit the Toledo area killing 13 people and injuring hundreds. Four people are killed by a twister near Temperance Michigan and eight people lose their lives in the storms in Wood and Henry Counties.

June 9

1904 - A crackdown begins on Toledo's many houses of ill-repute in the so called "Tenderloin" district. The new focus on the brothels is triggered by the discovery of two 14 year old girls working in the house of Lottie Barker on Lafayette Street.

1910 - City officials are being asked to reduce the speed limit on downtown streets from the current eight miles per hour to four or six miles per hour after a 14-year-old girl was struck and killed at Madison and Erie streets by a speeding car.

1921 - Two Toledo Police officers, Harold Mossbrugger and Harry Dowell are killed in a shootout with a barricaded gunman at 611 Walnut St. Police sharpshooters later open fire and kill the suspect.

1933 - A heat wave continues in Northwest Ohio. Mercury reaches 100 degrees in Bowling Green. Toledo has recorded numerous cases of people overcome by heat and at least three drownings from people trying to cool off in the river.

June 10

1916 - Judge James Austin says he cannot do much about the hundreds of women on the streets at night in Toledo. Austin insists that there is no room for them in the jails and all he can do is ask them to "behave."

1930 - Toledo's old and decrepit Union Station is leveled by flames to the cheers and delight of thousands who watched it burn. Toledo officials soon begin a campaign to raise money for a new and improved train station for Toledo. It wouldn't be built for another 20 years.

1942 - It's announced that a large magnesium plant will be built at Luckey Ohio. They will extract the magnesium from limestone in a local quarry.

1961 - The Anthony Wayne Trail in the Collingwood area is turned into a deadly inferno when a gasoline tanker truck explodes and burns. The fire and blast kills four Toledo firemen, injures many others, as well as scores of local residents. Several homes are lost in the fire.

June 11

1782 - American Colonel William Crawford is burned at the stake along the Tymochtee Creek in Wyandot County. Crawford was cruelly executed by Native Americans who mistakenly believed that Crawford led a raid, earlier that spring, on the Native American village at Gnadenhuden where 96 innocents were slaughtered.

1840 - Perrysburg becomes a national focal point as the Great Whig Gathering is held at Ft. Meigs. Thousands of members of the Whig Party assemble at the Fort to nominate William Henry Harrison for President of the United States.

1879 - Baseball great and Hall of Fame player Roger Bresnahan is born in Toledo. 1897 - Owney, the world-famous traveling U.S. Postal Mascot is shot to death in Toledo after reportedly biting a postal clerk at the train depot. The beloved mutt terrier is mounted and stuffed the next day by a Toledo taxidermist and his stuffed body eventually ends up in the Smithsonian Institute where his amazing story is still told to this day.

1922 - YWCA in Toledo is in vigorous campaign to establish a minimum wage in the state of Ohio. Local pastors have joined their cause, but industry critics say a minimum wage is a socialist idea and will cause more jobs to be lost if employers have to raise wages.

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# Sentencing scheduled in hazing death

Sentencing hearings have been set for two defendants convicted in the fraternity hazing death of a student at Bowling Green State University.

Jacob Krinn will be sentenced July 8 and Troy Henricksen will be sentenced July 29 in Wood County Common Pleas Court.

After seven days of testimony and almost eight hours of deliberation by the jury, the two were found not guilty of all homicide and felony charges. Krinn was found guilty of hazing, furnishing alcohol to an underage person, and obstructing official business.

Henricksen was found guilty of eight counts of hazing and seven counts of furnishing alcohol to an underage person.

The hazing counts are fourth degree misdemeanors, carrying a maximum penalty of 30 days in jail. The count of obstructing official business is a second degree misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of 90 days in jail.

Each count of furnishing alcohol to an underage person is an unclassified misdemeanor, carrying a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a minimum fine of \$500.

In Ohio, misdemeanor jail terms cannot exceed 18 months.

Six other defendants in the case entered into plea deals with the county

prosecutor’s office.

In the spring of 2021, Stone Foltz, 20, was rushing a fraternity along with several others – most of whom were under the legal drinking age.

Foltz consumed a 1-liter bottle of bourbon during the event and was taken back to his apartment where he was left alone and became unconscious.

A roommate later found him and emergency medical service personnel were called. Foltz was taken to Wood County Hospital and then transported to Toledo Hospital, where he died March 7 without regaining consciousness.

The Lucas County Coroner ruled his death as “fatal ethanol intoxication during hazing incident.”

“Clearly, we would have wanted to honor Stone’s memory more substantially than this,” Paul Dobson, county prosecutor, said after the trial. “We are thankful that this case has brought greater attention to the senseless pain and loss which hazing brings. I am proud that this office convicted every individual who was charged and five of the eight have been convicted of felonies.”

A detour route will be posted.



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# President Biden, Taiwan, and strategic ambiguity

At a stopover in Tokyo during his Asia trip, President Biden was asked whether the US would "defend Taiwan" if it were attacked. He said yes, because "that's the commitment we made." Actually, there is no formal "commitment," unlike defense obligations in US security treaties with Japan and South Korea. Biden has made the same incorrect assertion twice before, but this time it was in the context of the war in Ukraine, suggesting—but by no means confirming—what defending Taiwan might actually mean. Biden did, however, provide just enough fuel to raise questions about his adherence to previous policy based on "strategic ambiguity."

Let's keep in mind that U.S. presidents have supported Taiwan's defense for many years, not just by way of substantial military aid and active responses in crisis situations, such as in 1996 when China deployed missiles in an attempt to intimidate Taiwan during a presidential election. Presidents are also bound by the 1979 Taiwan Relations Act, which requires provision of defense assistance to Taiwan in the context of defining Taiwan as a U.S. national security interest.

The Act: "Declares that peace and stability in the [Taiwan] area are in the political, security, and economic interests of the United States, and are matters of international concern. States that the United States decision to establish diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China rests upon the expectation that the future of Taiwan will be determined by peaceful means and that any effort to determine the future of Taiwan by other than peaceful



means, including by boycotts or embargoes is considered a threat to the peace and security of the Western Pacific area and of grave concern to the United States."

From that perspective, Biden's comment was less consequential than it might seem. Chinese strategists would have to presume, as in the past, that attacking Taiwan would precipitate direct US intervention.

#### The Ukraine Connection

Those who persist in seeing a Chinese threat everywhere have been encouraged in that belief by Russia's Ukraine war, seeing parallels between Putin's view of Ukraine as a non-country and Xi Jinping's view of Taiwan as inevitably part of China. But aside from the differences in status between Ukraine and Taiwan—Ukraine is an independent country, whereas the U.S. has long recognized Taiwan as being part of "one China"—there are vastly different policy perspectives in Moscow and Beijing.

While Putin is literally out to destroy Ukraine and grab as much of its territory as possible, Xi has every reason to avoid launching an aggressive war on Taiwan. Though Xi would surely want to lay claim

to being the Chinese leader who finally recovered Taiwan, he is rational enough to realize how militarily difficult and economically costly that would be—and how contrary to the overwhelming desires of the Taiwanese people. Therein lie the real lessons of Putin's debacle in Ukraine.

The State Department walked back Biden's comment, and Biden himself insisted U.S. policy on Taiwan had not changed. Nevertheless, the Chinese responded as they had on previous occasions, accusing the U.S. of "playing with fire," interfering in China's internal affairs, which includes Taiwan, and violating past US pledges. This comes after Xi had actually complimented Biden in their last video summit for abiding by the one-China principle. All that Biden accomplished was to give the hawks in Xi's inner circle more ammunition for viewing the US as a hostile and untrustworthy rival.

U.S.-China tensions over Taiwan are embedded in their rivalry across the Asia-Pacific map. It is that rivalry that carries the risk of a disastrous miscalculation of each other's intentions, whether over Taiwan or somewhere else.

China has engaged in provocative flights near Taiwan in the past year and has greatly enhanced its air and naval power in East Asia. Beijing has become increasingly assertive militarily and diplomatically in the South China Sea and the South Pacific.

China's support of Russia in the Ukraine war is closely monitored by the US. The US has continued Trump-era upgrades of official visits to Taiwan and military assistance, and under Biden has built coalitions dedicated to containing China:

the Quad Security Dialogue (U.S., Japan, Australia, India), the AUKUS (Australia, United Kingdom, U.S.) partnership, as a NATO mission, and now in the 13-nation so-called Indo-Pacific Economic Framework that Biden introduced during his recent Asia tour. (Interestingly, Taiwan is not included in that agreement.) All these issues intensify the U.S.-China competition and could lead to a test of strength at sea or in the air, a test that could slide into reliance on nuclear threats.

"Strategic ambiguity" is not an ideal basis for policy on either side, for the simple reason that ambiguity can lead to miscalculations. But it has kept tense relations across the Strait from leading to a blowup. U.S.-China friction over Taiwan is bound to continue, but so long as the U.S. or Taiwan doesn't cross the red line on independence, and so long as Chinese leaders adhere to the policy of peaceful unification, friction will not lead to war.

The U.S. needs to recalibrate its military and political relationship with Taiwan to avoid the appearance of supporting Taiwan's separation, in short, maintaining what some observers call a 1.5 China policy, and China needs to refrain from provocative military maneuvers near Taiwan.

Both countries' leaders are sane enough to understand the costs of war, and for China especially, Ukraine demonstrates not an alluring precedent but a terrible price attacking Taiwan would likely exact.

The lodge has been under construction since 2020. Nearly complete, the architecture incorporates the surrounding woods and natural landscape into its rustic design.

Per Northwood Codified Ordinance 674.01, no owner, lessee, agent or tenant of land shall permit noxious weeds or grass to grow that are about to spread or mature seeds, or which are eight (8) inches or more in height. Failure to keep such weeds or grass cut in conformity with this section shall constitute a violation of this section, a minor misdemeanor offense.

If a property with tall grass is not mowed, the City of Northwood will mow the property at a minimum of \$125.00 per hour, per worker or if over one (1) hour of time is involved, \$125.00 for each additional hour for each worker and render an invoice within five working days from this initial cutting date. Thereafter, billing will be issued following all cuttings, such expense will be assessed upon your property and made a lien thereon and be collected in the manner provided by law.

The owner or person having charge of this property shall maintain it accordance with the code. If weeds or grass reach a height of eight (8) inches or more, a City contractor will certify such height to the City and cut the area without further notice to the owner, lessee, agent or tenant of this land.




