

## Lake front line hitters trying to elevate even higher

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Last year, Lake volleyball won its' first league title since 1976, when the Flyers competed in the Northern Lakes League.

The Flyers finished 20-3 overall and 12-1 in the Northern Buckeye Conference, sharing the title with Eastwood. This year, they want to go one further and qualify for the regional tournament for the first time in school history.
"Our goal is to finish undefeated in the league and make a decent tournament run. We haven't won districts ever at our school so that is our goal," Lake seventhyear coach Amy Vorst said.
"Overall, these kids are playing well. They are getting better every day. They play for each other, so that's a big part of it. We have the best chemistry I think we have ever had. I think that is a key. We have amazing parents who support the girls and overall, this is what we have been working for."

Of course, they still had to get past Eastwood Thursday. Lake, ranked 10th in the Division III state coaches' poll, defeated Eastwood, ranked 15th, in straight sets 2520, 25-20, 25-18 on the Flyers' floor.

Lake leaders were sophomore outside hitter Taryn Dewese with 12 kills and 10 assists, junior hitter Ella Vorst with nine
kills, senior hitter Cassidey Wiley with kigh, senior hills, and junior outside hitter Zoe eight kills, and junior outside hitter Zoe Ager with five aces and 15 digs. Lake made sure their field house was filled to the brim for the first showdown between the two teams.
"It was awesome. We tried to pack the gym and we were close. We had tons of community support and tons of student support. It was incredible," said Vorst.

Heading into Thursday night's game, Lake was $16-1$ overall and 9-0 in the Northern Buckeye Conference, while Eastwood's only loss all season was to the Flyers. Vorst knew the environment at Eastwood would be packed with excitement, too, because she is an Eastwood graduate who won a state championship her senior year.
"It's always different over there. They always bring it. He (Eastwood coach Jeff Beck) definitely does a good job over there," Vorst said.

Lake has the height to take on just about anyone. Ella Vorst, the coaches' daughter, stands 6-foot-2, Wiley is 6-0, Dewese stands 5-11 and junior Skylar Foster is $5-11$, but pushing $6-0$, says Vorst.


Dewese, sophomore setter Vayda Delventhal and senior Lani Robinson are six-rotation players, which adds to the team's depth. So, don't just look at that DS next to their name because they'll be on the front line, too.

Dewese leads the team in kills with 163 followed by Wiley (157) and Vorst (153) Wiley has 26 aces, followed by Dewese (25), Delventhal (23) and Foster (22). The best passers are Delventhal with 298 as sists, which is six per set, and Dewese has 187. No one else has more than 46 assists.

Defensively, DS Sydney Stanley has 218 digs, averaging 12.8 per match, followed by Delventhal (149), Dewese (135) and Ager (84). Stanley also leads the team in serve receiving at 14.9 per match.

Lake has been so dominant in many matches, that learning a tough lesson when they traveled to take on No. 2 ranked Ottawa-Glandorf at The Supreme Court in Putnam County was not such a bad thing.

The Flyers were used to smashing kills with little opposition. Their opponents' best hopes were usually to get on the floor and dig them out. At O-G, the Titans gave the Flyers a lesson in blocks, winning 2522 , 19-25, 25-16, 25-20 and giving Lake
their only loss. Coming against a team that could block kill attempts was a good lesson to learn during the regular season, Vorst said.

O-G is a team that Lake could match up against if they both reach the regional tournament. Vorst was pleased to see her squad make the regular season match competitive, even winning a set.
"It was not a blowout by any means. We definitely did OK," Vorst said. "We're not making excuses. They played well and they have an established program there. O-G is ranked second in the state and there has to be a reason."

The Flyers have been working on blocks because when two solid teams go against each other, you see more and more of that action above the net. Wiley has a team-leading 29 blocks, followed by Vorst (27) and Dewese (16). Part of that is learning to get a kill attempt past the block.

We've been working on shots, and we work on blocking every day. We haven't really put a lot of effort on blocking, but this year we've spent more time on that," Vorst said. "We literally work on hitting shots every day, and not just banging the ball and putting it nowhere. The girls have a good
game plan every time they go out."
Other big non-league wins have come over Sylvania Southview, Defiance, Evergreen and Oak Harbor, all in straight sets. In two games during the Southview Spiketacular, DeWese led the Flyers with 25 kills, Wiley with 20 kills and Ella Vorst with 16 kills.

However, to get to the regional, coach Vorst believes her team will have to go through Liberty-Benton or Huron in the district tournament. Huron is ranked eighth in the state poll.

Plus, no matter what happened Thursday night between the Flyers and Eagles, there still remains some solid competition in the NBC that can give teams fits he second time through the schedule.
"Elmwood is pretty good. They took a set from us," Vorst said. "(Coach) Krissy (Lotycz) has them doing something different and she has a game plan, I'll put it that way. (6-2 hitter Brooklyn) Thrash played very well against us. They have some athletes there and she is a good coach. She has a good volleyball IQ. She is doing a good job with those kids. She did a good job at Fostoria and now she's doing a good job at Elmwood."


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## Rockets achieving milestones, eyeing postseason run

Behind a special group of seniors and a fantastic supporting cast, Oak Harbor volleyball finds itself in position to chase a Sandusky Bay Conference Bay Division title and hopefully make a run in the postseason.

The Rockets are currently 12-4 and 3-2 in the Bay Division and have some impressive victories on their resume, among them wins over Central Catholic, Edison and Fremont Ross.

The Rockets are led by Reagan Schultz, who currently holds four school records, and was the first player in school history to register 1,000 digs. Grace Wolf followed by eclipsing 1,000 digs in Oak Harbor's win over Willard last week. Schultz broke son, a mark that was held by Olivia Rahm, who is now an assistant with the team, and Schultz also holds the record for digs in season (394) and assists in a game (58).
"I love how this sport is team-driven and how everyone has to chip in to succeed," said Schultz

Schultz is joined by five fellow seniors who have led the way for a team looking to make some noise. Those seniors are Wolf, Ryann and Riley Steinbrick, Breanna Bowlick and Jaycee Snyder. The rest of the roster includes Reese Adkins, Elise Mollison, Hayley Burhro, Emma Lynch Megan Rife and Jaylin Underwood.

Bowlick, who coach Jackie Gezo counts as an unsung hero, leads the team with 226 digs, followed by Schultz (210) and Wolf (145). Wolf has 214 kills and Ryann Steinbrick has 135, and Steinbrick leads the team with 44 blocks.
"The team is all driven by passion," Schultz said. "All the six seniors are really close, we do it for each other, we do it for the seniors and the rest of the team, and we push through. It's our last year of ever playing volleyball. It's all we have left, so let's give it what we ve got."
"Che also credits Gezo for her efforts
"Coach Gezo is very respectful, very fun to be around. She always pushes us to be our best," Schultz said, "but also have fun while we're doing it.

The Rockets started the season with a bang, taking its first eight matches, but most recently had to defeat Willard, 3-2, to stop a three-game losing streak. "We're trying to build our confidence back up after the three losses last week," said Gezo. "It was a turning point to get back into competition in the league and get back on track with winning.

Oak Harbor has also defeated Genoa, Woodmore, Clyde, Mansfield Madison, Lakota, Rossford, Toledo Christian and Port Clinton.

Gezo holds a career record of 109-51 (.681) in her seventh season and reached 100 victories a few weeks ago. The program has reached new heights under her tenure - a district title, a league championship, an undefeated regular season, three sectional titles and some marquee victories over Huron, one of the top programs in the state.

The pinnacle came in 2017 and ' 18 in 17, the Rockets won the Bay Division and their first 24 matches before falling to Central Catholic in the Division II district finals, 3-1. But Oak Harbor got over the hump the next year, dominating their district and advancing to the regional semifinals before losing to Parma Heights Holy Name, 3-0, which advanced to win the state championship.
"That was the first team since '89 to reach regionals," said Gezo

The Rockets won their first sectional title in 21 years in '16.

A 1983 Oak Harbor graduate, Gezo has coached within the program for 16 years ranging from the JV coach to the freshman coach and coaching both grades in the junior high - before taking the varsity job. She credits her players from the Class of 2018, which consisted of Peyton Bloomer, Logan Harris, Kaytlynn Sandwisch, Alayna Hetrick and Jill Thorbahn, who she led as the eighth grade coach in ' 14 , with talking her into taking over for Megan Maguire.

Gezo's other assistant coaches are her daughter, Abbie, the JV coach, and Sandwisch.

I know they want to do better in the tournament," said Sandwisch. "Some of the seniors got to play in the regional semifinal game when I was a senior, and they have the desire and drive to win. It's now or never."

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## Lake's Feather rebounds on back 9 for top honors

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Lake senior golfer Olivia Feather picked up the sport for fun, but now it has become a passion. This year, she was the Northern Buckeye Conference Co-Player of the Year.
"I started out my first year as a sophomore playing golf and I ended up taking lessons with one of my friends, (profes sional) Dave (Sanford) at Crosswinds and it went well," Feather said.
"Then, the summer before this past summer, my sister and I and a few of our church friends just went out and played throughout the summer just for fun. It ended up bettering me and my game because we went out so often. We played at Sugar Creek almost every weekend.

Feather and Otsego golfer Elizabeth Jackson were named NBC Co-Players of the Year as the Knights won the league championship.

The two golfers scored 232 points each in league shootouts and Jackson averaged 44 strokes per nine holes, Feather averaged 48.9 strokes.

Feather never saw the POY award coming. She had some rough rounds in nonleague shootouts, good rounds in league shootouts, but it took a good round at the 18-hole league tournament at Green Hills Golf Course in Clyde to make that happen. "It's pretty great. I honestly was not even expecting it because I had a few lost matches, but then I took into consideration that they were not the NBC shootouts," Feather said.
"They were dual matches or whatev er. For the most part, I had pretty decent shootout scores. They were OK, I guess, and I ended up getting a 93 at Green Hills to win medalist."

Feather shot 52 on the front, but then rebounded to shoot 12 strokes better on the back nine in windy weather.
"I had a 41 (on the back nine), because I started out really bad because we started on the front, hole No. 1. The wind would pick up and it would slow down a little bit," Feather said.


Lake second-year coach Alexis Schultz has seen Feather improve over the last two years.
'I think she improved a lot. Last year she came into the season kind of unsure of how good she was and the potential that she had as a golfer. I think that once somebody was telling her that she can do this and she can be a very good athlete, she kind of took that and ran with it," Schultz said. "She definitely improved over the season, and last year's season she improved as well. With this season, she just got better and better in every match, so she has improved greatly.

Schultz is driving the ball 200 yards, but more importantly, Schultz says she is accurate
"Personally, I think her best aspect of her game is her long shot - her drives and her woods," Schultz said. "She has always been very accurate with her distance and her accuracy with direction when it comes to her driver and her approach shots. She has always been very good with those."

The Knights scored 48 points from shootouts and the final tournament, followed by runner-up Lake (42), Elmwood (33), Eastwood (29), Woodmore (26), Rossford (17), and Genoa (15).

Joining Feather and Jackson on the All NBC first team are Summer Berry (Otsego), 47.6, Sarah Patrick (Lake), 48.7, Macy Perry (Woodmore), 51.9, and Evelyn Hartman Otsego), 52.3
Second team selections are Lily Schwalbe (Genoa), 54.7, Sydney Doughten (Rossford), 53.4, Mariah Hahn (Eastwood), 55.6, Evie Hall (Eastwood), 54.5, Jewell Collins (Lake), 53.9, and Maddie Milligan (Elmwood), 56.1
Honorable mention picks include Sydnie Piper (Elmwood), 55.2, Sophie Repka (Woodmore), 56.2, Libby Welly (Fostoria), 55.6, Shannon Benner 6.odmore), 55.8, Ella Speck (E) 55.1 Lake was second at the league tournament at Green Hills Golf Course in Clyde, scoring 411 to trail Otsego (407). Schultz was pleased about the finish, but even more pleased for her team's future.
"Other than we have a very new team, we are excited for the future and what it has in store for us. We have a lot of new alent coming in as freshmen. Sarah Patrick be very good over the next couple years, be very good over the next couple years," She was outstanding this season as well," Shultz said.

Schultz says that part of the reason Patrick's game is flourishing is because of Feather.
"Sarah and Olivia are actually close friends, so that helps them motivate each other to want to be better and compete against each other," Schultz said.

Lake scores at the NBC meet included Patrick (48-47-95), Collins (57-52-109), Morgan Feather (59-55-114), Jade Rose (57-58-115), and Abby Loving (57-60-117), Rose is the only other senior and Loving is a junior.

The Lake golfers season ended at the Division II sectionals at Ironwood near Wauseon. The Flyers shot 418 to finish fourth behind champion Gibsonburg (380), Archbold (394) and Wauseon (395). If the Flyers had finished third, they would have advanced.

Patrick shot 49-48-97, Feather shot 50-52-102, Collins scored a 54-52-106, Loving shot 56-57-113 and Rose scored 68-60-128.

As a freshman at the Division I state tournament, Donnelly was part of an Arrows' team that finished 10th out of 12 teams. Donnelly shot 91-88-179 to finish 62nd individually out of 72 golfers and her team shot 666.

"I think she can go anywhere she wants. She has the power and the distance to play at a very high level," McGowan said.

Donnelly was hoping to make it to the state meet last year, but fell short, even though she upped her game. Donnelly was also named TRAC Golfer of the Year her sophomore year after shooting a 76 and her team shot a 331 to win a league tournament championship.

McGowan believes the team should not fail if they want to reach the state tournament
"Unless we get COVID, we'll be there for sure. Everybody we have got to beat we've played multiple times and they
haven't even been close," McGowan said.

The reason - Donnelly and her teammates are all that much better, says McGowan.
"Her game has come around in every aspect. She works at it non-stop," McGowan said. "She is totally committed to the game. She's a 12 -month a year golfer. She practices all the time."

That includes the winter months, even if she does not head to warmer climate, and even if she has to drive long distances. McGowan says if the weather hits the right temperature in the winter, she head for the golf course to play a round outdoors. She has been playing since she was 5 -years-old.
"She hits some indoor places. We can get her on a lot of places that she can go. We get her out to Quarry Ridge (Ottawa Lake, Mich.) - we meet there once a week in the winter months and it gives her a chance to do that. That is a heck of a drive for her. We're staying up at The Legacy right now, which is where we practice, which is like 40 minutes home for her."

McGowan says Donnelly's athleticism and work ethic puts her over the top.

I think she can pick any sport at St Ursula and she would be one of the best players," McGowan said.

Donnelly's teammates are from Sylvania or Perrysburg. At the league meet, Averi Cline shot 84, Hannah Chung an 86 and Emma Meyers and Lexie Murphy both shot 87. They took five of the top six spots at the league tournament. It is a group that

The Clay High School Athletic Hall of Fame inducted Justin Wharton (Class of 2009) and Nick Tammerine (2010) into the Class of 2020 inductees and Jesse Castilleja (2011), Eryn Simon (2010), Nick Garcia (2010) and Meghan Scharer (2010) into its Class of 2021.

Justin Wharton was a first team AllOhio wrestler (2009) and two-time state qualifier $(2008,2009)$. He was a three-time sectional champion (2007-09), two-time league champion $(2008,2009)$ and league runner-up in 2006. He was a four-time letter winner.
"Justin's passion for the sport and dogged determination were very contagious and helped usher in the longest sustained period of excellence in Clay wres tling history," states his HOF bio. "His de sire to continually challenge himself and his teammates helped raise the standards on the team and in the program."

In football, Nick Tammerine was the school record holder in career rushing yards, career carries, career TDs and career points scored, and a three-time letterman. He won two letters in wrestling and four in track, where all four years he led the team in points and was the school record holder in the 200 meter dash, 400 -meter dash, and with the $4 \times 100$ and $4 \times 400$ relay teams.
"Nick was an exceptionally gifted athlete with an intensely competitive spirit," stated his bio. "He was up for any challenge and was unwilling to concede anything. His drive to succeed fueled his career as a three-sport athlete.'

In his junior year on the baseball field, Jesse Castilleja hit his way to first team allleague and, in his senior year, he pitched his way to first team all-league, all-district, and All-Ohio.

Jesse developed a tough-minded attitude as a wrestler and he carried that with him on the baseball diamond where he excelled as a two-way player," his bio stated.

In softball, Eryn Simon was first team All-Ohio (2009, 2010), first team all-district and all-league (2008-10) and Toledo City

League Player of the Year in 2010. In soccer, Simon was first team all-league in 2008 and 2009, second team all-league in 2007 second team all-district in 2008 and 2009 and honorable mention all-league in 2006. In both softball and soccer, she was team captain her junior and senior years.
"Eryn enjoyed a terrific two-sport career at Clay. She was a gifted athlete who had a strong work ethic and was very coachable - highly respected player and teammate," her bio stated.

In wrestling, Nick Garcia was a twotime first team All-Ohioan (2009, 2010), three-time league champion (2008-10) and three-year letter winner.
"Having never wrestled before, Nick first stepped foot on the mat as a freshman. Fiercely competitive, powerful, and determined, he quickly developed into a dominant force," Garcia's bio stated. "By the time his career ended, Nick's accomplishments placed him in the upper echelon of

Clay's storied wrestling program.
Meghan Scharer earned 14 varsity letters during her career at Clay, including four in soccer, two in cross country, four in basketball, and four in track and field. Her soccer team was the Northwest Ohio Scholastic Soccer League and sectional champions in 2007 and 2008. She was named NWOSSL Player of the Year in 2008 and 2009.

Scharer was a regional qualifier in cross country in 2006. In track, she was a regional finalist in the 300 hurdles in 2007 and 2009, and in pole vault in 2009 and 2010. She was a district champion in the pole vault in 2009.

Additionally, in soccer Scharer was first eam all-league from 2007-09, first team alldistrict and second team All-Ohio in 2008 and 2009. She was first team All-City League in cross country in 2006 and 2007, and in basketball she was HM All-City her first three years, Special Mention her senior year, and HM all-district in 2009-10. In track, she
was first team All-City her senior year. Scharer was the City League scholar athlete representative for Clay High School and was awarded Clay's Leta Wescott Outstanding Student Athlete Award her senior year. The Leta Wescott Award is the most prestigious award and is presented to a female athlete based on leadership, attitude, sportsmanship, value to the team, commitment, and grade point average.

After graduating from Clay, Scharer atended the University of Dayton where she earned four varsity letters in soccer. She was named team captain in 2012 and 2013 and earned second team All-Atlantic 10 honors in 2013. She was awarded the Stacy Martin Memorial Award in 2012 and 2013 by her teammates for leadership on and off the field.

Also honored was 2019-20 All-Ohio soccer player Rylee Clark and three 202021 All-Ohioans-Tyler Cobb (wrestling), Abram Hagedorn (swimming) and Micah Medina (wrestling)
