

Drop a line for great fishing in Lake Erie



Great news for fishermen

Lake Erie maintains its title as The Walleye Capital of the World thanks to science-based management guiding regulations that conserve and ensure longterm angling opportunities across Ohio's waters.

Additionally, a strong yellow perch population in Lake Erie's west zone is providing good fishing in 2022, while low catch rates are expected to continue in the central and east zones.

Lake Erie walleye and yellow perch fisheries are managed through an interagency quota system. Each jurisdiction regulates its catches to comply with annually determined safe harvest levels that ensure sustainability. The most recent quotas were announced March 25.

Walleye – The walleye daily limit on Lake Erie is six fish per angler with a 15-

inch minimum length lim it. Walleve hatch success has been exceptional for six of the past eight years. Anglers will mostly catch abundant 2- to 4-year-oldfish ranging from 15 to 22 inches. Larger fish from 2015 and earlier hatches will provide chances to reel in a Fish Ohio qualifying walleye (minimum 28 inches).

Abundant young fish should show up in the catch and range from 9 to 14 inches, with an increasing number of 2-year-olds reaching 15 inches as the season progresses. Anglers are encouraged to release these sub-legal fish

with as little handling as possible so they can contribute to the future fishery.

Yellow perch - Yellow perch abundance in the west zone from Toledo to Huron was above average in 2021 and is expected to remain strong in 2022, supported by consistent hatch success. The 2021 season occasionally provided good fishing in the west zone and should again in 2022. The best success is anticipated during July through mid-August during warm-water periods, and again during mid-October through November as adult perch move to shallow water to

Lake Erie's central zone from Huron to Fairport Harbor continues to experience low yellow perch abundance, primarily driven by poor to moderate hatches during the past decade. Conservative quotas continue to be set each year. In the east zone from Fairport Harbor to Conneaut, catches have been similar to the central zone with a slightly larger adult population. Catch rates are expected to remain low during the 2022 season, except for times such as late fall when adult perch congregate in larger schools near harbors.

Bass - Smallmouth bass and largemouth bass fishing in 2022 will provide good fishing with the opportunity for trophy catches. The daily limit is five

bass per day,

Lake Erie fishing reports, information on Lake Erie research and management programs, fisheries resources, maps, and links to other Lake Erie web resources are available at wildohio.gov. The current fishing regulations can be found on the HuntFish OH app, at wildohio.gov, or locations where fishing licenses are sold.

The HuntFish OH app, available at the Apple Store on the Google Play Store, allows users to purchase fishing and hunting licenses, permits, stamps and the Wild Ohio magazine.

Users can also:

- Display licenses and permits.
- Submit game check from the phone, even without a connection and obtain a confirmation code once the phone reestablishes service.
- Find interactive maps with directions and information on Ohio's public lands, boat ramps, lakes, shooting ranges and license agents.



Kelleys Island an important stopover for owl migration

The Owl Fest event every November on Kelleys Island is a crowd pleaser, only without the big crowds.

It's only part of a fall filled with great scenery and birds.

The 10th annual Fest is set for Nov. 4-6, but the public is welcome at the banding site any evening it's in operation, as well as daytime banding of migrating songbirds.

It all calls attention to Kelleys Island's important role as a stopover for owls during bird migration, and it's done in an up-close and personal way. Really close — photo opportunity close — like sometimes as close as a few feet.

The Fest is centered on netting and banding northern saw-whet owls by master bander Tom Bartlett and his wife Paula, with help from Kelleys Island State Park Manager Chris Ashley and Jackie Taylor, director of the Kelleys Island Field Station.

Also featured is the Owl Prowl led by Pat Hayes, Kelleys Islands Audubon president, which is an island-wide search for owls held Friday evening, Nov.4.

"Last year we walked all the way to the tower at North Pond State Nature Preserve calling for owls," Pat said. "We heard saw-whet owls, screech, great-horned, and we even thought we heard a barred owl. Everyone loved it."

It's a good bet that most readers have never seen or heard a saw-whet owl, one of the smallest owl species in North America. Those who see this secretive species are wowed by its catlike face, oversized head, and bright yellow eyes.

They're only one of many bird species that drop in on the Erie islands during migration. Most of them are songbirds that move through during the daytime hours on their way across the lake. You can enjoy them close-up, too, by visiting Tom and Paula at the nets they set up earlier in the day and work on many mornings.

And you'll enjoy the island, too. Island residents will tell you fall is the

very best time to be on the Erie islands – fewer crowds, fall colors, crisp weather, and ferry service still available, though on a more limited schedule.

No need to pack the swimsuit or shorts and sandals. Fall-weight clothing is in order, along with comfortable walking shoes. A flashlight or a headlamp is a darn good idea, too. So's a camera.

The birds love it, too. Some are permanent residents; others pause on their way south to rest and refuel after crossing Lake Erie from Ontario. The island – Kelleys is the largest American island in Lake Erie, is dotted with natural ar-

eas protected in the state park, state nature preserves and parcels preserved by Cleveland Museum of Natural History,

The Bartletts begin their fall banding in early September following a schedule that takes them to South Bass and Middle Bass islands, as well as Kelleys, and doesn't end until the Christmas Bird Count in December. Saw-whet owl netting and banding doesn't begin on Kelleys until mid-October and is most active during November.

The goal is to capture the tiny owls, interrupting their migration from Ontario southward across Lake Erie long enough to record their measurements and band them, before sending them unharmed on their way again. That means working at night, setting up and monitoring 15 nets. They're set up in groups of five in three different locations spaced along the island's northern shore.

They'll keep the effort going on various nights until the Christmas Bird Count on Dec. 20.

These small secretive owls, like most owls, move at night.

"It seems like the owls come from Ontario's Point Pelee, head over the lake to the closest land they can see – Pelee Island, then to Middle Island and Kelleys," Tom said. From there they'll leave

From there they'll leave Kelleys and make the short flight to the Marblehead Peninsula.

"Once they're there it seems they go wherever the wind blows them."

The work on Kelleys Island is helping fill in some blanks about this tiny reclusive owl. Because of their size and nocturnal behavior, they're poorly understood birds. While you might hear them, they're seldom seen. In daytime they hunker down silently on roosts in dense conifers.

Tom's work with saw-whets began in 2003.

"Friends banding at Holiday Beach (Ontario, near Point Pelee) called and said they're having a phenomenal year banding saw-whet owls," Tom said. "They said 'Why don't you try banding at Kelleys?"

"So I did, and within an hour, I had my first saw-whet," he said.

He and Paula have been banding them every fall since. Last fall, he captured his 1000th saw-whet.

"The good news is I caught our 1000th owl on Nov. 3, (2021)," Tom said. "The bad news is I released it without putting on a band. We took all the data, but after releasing it, I saw the band was still in the pliers.

"Fortunately, Chris came in a few minutes later with another owl, so we still put on our 1000th band that night."

Since that first year, they've added nets, locations, and more nights in the field banding owls. Every night is different. Some nights there are no owls,

sometimes one or two, sometimes they just keep coming.

"It seems like we have the best luck with east winds," Tom said.

Each net is about 50 feet long and about 8.5 feet high, designed to catch the birds unharmed. The five nets are arranged three in a row one direction, with one on each side running perpendicularly to form a cross. The nets are rolled up when not in use.

Last year, their peak nights came back-to-back.

"We netted 42 saw-whets the first night and 40 the second," Tom said. "We stayed out until 1 a.m."

All the information collected at the Kelleys Island Bird Banding Station is shared with other stations. The Ohio Owlnet combines information from 12

banding stations specifically aimed at learning more about owl migration.

Banding is a way of life for Tom and Paula. For over 50 years they've spread the wealth of their efforts, banding on other Lake Erie islands as well, adding to our understanding of things that, even in our modern world, are mysteries.

They've learned important things along the way. The main points sound simple, but the points were contested not so long ago.


"We know now that the islands are vital to migratory birds," Tom said. "And we know they do fly across water. Within the last two years, I have experienced another reason for banding. My data from the Lake Erie Islands has been used to help purchase valuable pieces of land on three islands."

Along the way, he's shared his knowledge with thousands of visitors who are welcome to drop in and visit the banding stations, observing the work underway.

History Roundtable returns in-person with a virtual option

After being virtual for the past two years, History Roundtable with Mike Gilbert returns to in-person sessions this fall at the Hayes Presidential Library & Museums in Fremont.

Pre-recorded virtual sessions also will be offered for those who cannot attend in person.

Gilbert, a retired teacher, will share his historical research and findings on a variety of topics, including Amelia Earhart, John C. Fremont and Rutherford B. Hayes in honor of Hayes' 200th birthday this October.

Six sessions are offered on Saturdays in September and October. Sessions are from 10-11:30 a.m.

Online admission is \$5 per session or \$25 for all six. Pre-registration and pre-payment for both in-person and virtual sessions are required.

This presentation is guaranteed to increase your knowledge concerning the people involved in the tragic death of the 16th president.
- Sept. 17 Amelia Earhart What motivated one of America's most famous female pilots? This discussion will take an in-depth look at the woman behind the publicity. Did her personal motivations affect her disappearance? You be the judge as the session focuses on one of our country's greatest mysteries.
- Sept. 24 John C. Fremont Curious about the city of Fremont's

- Oct. 8 Rutherford B. Hayes Help celebrate the 200th birthday of the 19th president and his ever-lasting effect on the local community. Follow along as the session pays tribute to his years as a small-town lawyer, a soldier in the Civil War, serving as president of the United States and return to his beloved Spiegel Grove
- Oct. 15 Valley of the Kings Situated in the ancient city of Thebes, The Valley of the Kings is the ancient burial site of nearly all of the kings during the 18th, 19th and 20th century Egyptian dynasties. Pharaohs, like King Tut, will help explain the burial practices of this ancient civilization.

• Oct. 22 – Things that go bump in the night – Vampires and werewolves lead the way as this session investigates the spooky creatures lurking in nightmares. In a change from Gilbert's traditional ghost stories, this session will delve into the origins of these mythical beings that have intrigued millions throughout the world.

The Hayes Presidential Library & Museums, located at Spiegel Grove at the corner of Hayes and Buckland avenues, is America's first presidential library and the forerunner for the federal presidential library system. It is partially funded by the state of Ohio and affiliated with the Ohio History Connection.





Oregon Jerusalem Historical Society Brandville School

Built in 1882, the historic Brandville School has been restored and is now part of the Oregon-Jerusalem Historical Society complex. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1994.

Brandville School houses artifacts from Native Americans who lived in the Great Black Swamp area. There is also a military room with artifacts from all the major conflicts in which the United States has been involved, dating from 1812 to the present.

The Carriage House includes vi-

gnettes of the old Metzger General Store, a doctor's office and an old post office. The one-room schoolhouse will take visitors back to the turn of the 20th Century.

Harbor View Historical Society & Museum

Located in the historical neighborhood of Harbor View in the city of Oregon, the Harbor View Historical Society and Museum continues to attract visitors from all over the country and Canada.

The Society Complex is situated on the land originally deeded to the Ottawa chief named OTT-TO-KEE (Autokee) for his assistance to the American Forces during the War of 1812.

Located nearly 100 yards outside of the Harbor View Yacht Club entrance on Autokee Street, the museum offers a glimpse of the War of 1812 and the Battle of Lake Erie in 1813.

The British long gun and the American carronade on display are from the 2003 movie "Master and Commander Far side of the World," starring Russel Crow, and due to popularity, have been continued for another season. The cannons allow visitors to get an up-close view of the cannons that were used at the Battle of Lake Erie in 1813. Other exhibits include "The United States Navy, Toledo "from 1933 to 1997, and the nearly 100-year-old Harbor View Post Office that has provided service to the small communities on Maumee Bay.

The Museum hosts many other special attractions throughout the year including 1862-LIVE, a Civil War encampment at the end of June, 1812-LIVE with members from the Old Northwest Military History Association along with re-enactors from Fort Meigs, Halloween Night at the Museum and a Christmas Holiday Open House.

Historic Genoa

Among the many mercantile, entertaining, and historical treasures the Village of Genoa, (founded in 1857) has to offer, the Historic Town Hall (built in 1883) is a must-see for a variety of reasons.

Located at 509 Main St., it is clas-



sified as the oldest free-standing municipal building in Ottawa County and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

Built in the Gothic revival style, the structure features eight ornamental chimneys, and a hand-carved sandstone mask of Dionysius, the Greek God of theater, which rests over the main entrance. The first floor houses the mayor's office and the village council chambers; the second floor is used by Genoa Civic Theater.

Genoa Privy, built to serve as Genoa's first school, is believed to be the only brick outhouse on the National Register of Historic Places.

Elmore Depot

The Elmore Historical Society purchased 1860s Elmore Depot in 1981, along with 2.5 acres of land. The society undertook an extensive renovation, and the building now houses memorabilia from Elmore's past.

In 1983, society members dismantled, relocated and rebuilt the 1940s Heckman log cabin, adding an elaborate flagstone fireplace and porch, and furnishing it with artifacts from its era.

Woodville Historical Museum

Pemberville highlights

The Pemberville Opera House is the crown jewel in properties restored and maintained by the Pemberville Historical Society. The Opera House is a "Theatre on the Second Floor." Built in 1892 and completely restored in 1999, it is one of the oldest operating opera houses in the state of Ohio. An elevator tower was added in 2016 so this theatre space is handicapped accessible.

The opera house is home to annual events such as "Live! In The House" a concert series, the Children's Theatre Workshop, "For the Love of Art Show" and the annual Festival of Trees.

Pemberville's historic Pember-Furry House and One-Room School takes visitors back in time to the 19th century. Believed to be the community's oldest existing building, the Furry House was built by village founder James Pember, and eventually was home to long-time residents Jacob H. Furry and his daughter, Minnie.

Featuring unique architectural details and authentic period furnishings, the house sits adjacent to the One Room School, where Pemberville's youth learned "readin' and writin" at the turn of the century.

Wood County Museum

Step back into time at The Wood County Museum.

The Museum is the site of the former County Infirmary, which operated from 1869-1971, and became a museum in 1975

Hayes Presidential Library & Museums

The Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Library and Museums is the nation's first Presidential library. It houses 19th U.S. President Rutherford B. Exhibits include interactive components that better tell the story of 19th U.S. President Rutherford B. Hayes and First Lady Lucy Webb Hayes. The museum now has a Presidents Gallery, which has artifacts from other U.S. Presidents and has a replica of the Resolute Desk. The original is located in the Oval Office of the White House.

Metroparks Toledo preserves many of Lucas County's most unique natural areas, from the Oak Openings to the Lake Erie coastal zone.

• Pearson Metropark, located at 761 Lallendorf Rd., Oregon, is one of the last remaining stands of the Great Black Swamp, a notorious forest that once blanketed much of Northwest Ohio. The thick woods and location close to Lake Erie make Pearson a favorite stopover for a wide variety of migrating birds. From birding to baseball to picnicking and fishing, there's something for everyone at Pearson. Open 7 a.m. until dark every

day; extended hours for winter recreation.

Remember what life was like for those settling the Great Black Swamp in the 1860s at the Johlin Cabin, built in 1867. The cabin is part of an addition to the park, accessible from Seaman Road or the park's trail system. Known as Pearson North, this area includes an extensive wetland restoration.

• Magee Marsh Wildlife Area supports an abundance of wildlife but is probably best known as one of the top birding spots in North America for migrating songbirds, especially warblers.

Birding at Magee Marsh can be done year-round, but the second and third week of May typically provide the most diverse numbers of songbird species for bird watchers. The most popular destination is the boardwalk bird trail, located at the end of the wildlife area road.

The Sportsmen's Migratory Bird Center (SMBC) is s currently closed for a renovation project. Be sure to visit when the building re-opens in the spring of 2023 to check out the re-designed, fully accessible Magee Marsh Visitor Center. 13229 W. SR 2, Oak Harbor

• Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge provides valuable habitat for a diversity of waterfowl and other migratory birds, resident wildlife, and endangered and threatened species.

During migration, the Refuge may host as many as 38 different species of warblers. The shrubs along the boardwalk and trails directly behind the Visitor Center provide excellent views of a variety of warblers and other migratory birds.

The Visitor Center welcomes guests



and tells the Refuge story. Friends of Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, the 501(c)3 nonprofit that supports the Refuge, operates a Nature Store in the Visitor Center. Proceeds from the store help to support the Refuge with education and restoration initiatives.

The Refuge features 10 miles of hiking trails and a Wildlife Drive to explore. Check the website or call ahead for updates on safety restrictions in place and other info.

The Metropark, which was previously a working farm, is adjacent to the Metzger Marsh State Wildlife Area in a region that also includes Maumee Bay State Park, Magee Marsh State Wildlife Area and the Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge. Together, these local, state and federal public lands are known for their concentration of songbirds, or warblers, especially during spring migration.

The quarter-mile Madewell Trail extends into a marsh, and two overlooks provide access for fishing and viewing birds. The fishery is still being established.

For the paddler, there are two rolloff docks, kayaks available to rent by the hour using smartphone app (Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day) and portages between marsh units.

Portage River Water Trail designated Ohio's 17th state water trail

On July 19, Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Director Mary Mertz designated the Portage River Water Trail as the 17th official water trail in the State of Ohio. This brings the total number of miles of designated water trails to more than 1,000.

"This trail provides even more exceptional opportunities for people to explore our state from the water," Mertz said. "Whether you're looking for a scenic kayak trip down the trail, a perfect place to cast a line, or a spot to soak in the sights and sounds of nature; this trail offers all that and more."

The 36-mile stretch of the Portage River winds through Wood, Ottawa and Sandusky counties. Paddlers, birders, anglers, and nature enthusiasts can connect with local parks and businesses by using one of the 12 access points between Pemberville and Port Clinton.

Efforts to obtain a "state water trail" designation for the Portage River began in 2019. With assistance from the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments, stakeholders in the Portage River Watershed formed a partnership to work collaboratively on the project. The partnership included the City of Port Clinton, the Friends of the Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, the Oak Harbor Development Group, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Ohio's Lake Erie Shores and Islands, the Ohio Sea Grant, the Ottawa County Commissioners, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the village of Elmore, the village of Oak Harbor, the village of Pemberville, the village of Woodville, and the Wood County Park District.

"We're thrilled to be able to offer this new resource for people in our region," said Ottawa County Commissioner Mark Coppeler, chair of TMACOG's Portage River Basin Council. "The new water trail creates so many opportunities to experience everything the Portage River and the communities along its banks have to offer."

The Ohio Water Trails program was created to promote public awareness to paddling access while working with local communities to develop water trails throughout the state of Ohio. The trails are planned on the local level with ODNR partnering with communities, user groups, park districts, and others.

Ohio's diverse system of water trails is statewide. Among others, it includes the Blanchard, Cuyahoga, Great Miami, Kokosing, Mahoning, Maumee and Olentangy rivers. These water trails pass through a variety of surroundings including natural, rural, suburban and urban areas. 
