Toledo Museum of Art

The Toledo Museum of Art is home to one of the finest and most diverse collections of artworks in the country. Visitors will discover treasures ranging from ancient Egyptian pieces to contemporary art, including glass, sculpture, European and American paintings, African and Asian art, graphic arts and decorative arts.

Other highlights include the Sculpture Garden outside and the architecturally renowned Glass Pavilion, a separate structure located across Monroe Street.

Current exhibitions include "Generational Echoes, Privilege, Power and the Transmission of Knowledge" (through July 7); "Beth Lipman: ReGift" (through Jan. 5, 2025); "From Asia to the World: Ancient to Contemporary Art" (through June 29, 2025); "In a New Light: Impressionism and Post-Impressionism" (through June 29, 2025); "Africa Unmasked" (through Aug. 30, 2025); "Expanding Horizons: The Evolving Character of a Nation," (through Feb. 28, 2025) and more.

### Toledo Zoo

The Toledo Zoo, voted a top family-friendly destination and number one zoo in the nation, boasts more than 10,000 mammals, fish, reptiles, amphibians, birds and invertebrates representing over 720 species.

Visitors from near and far come to the Toledo Zoo to stroll the scenic grounds and explore the historic WPA-era buildings. Among the Zoo's highlights are the Arctic Encounter, the Africa! exhibit, Nature's Neighborhood children's zoo, Tembo Trail, the Aquarium, the ProMedica Museum of Natural History and the Nancy L. and Martin Davidson Barnyard, an interactive exhibit where guests can meet alpacas, goats, pigs and other farm animals.

Earlier this year, the Zoo welcomed a new female African elephant calf, named Kirkja, born to African elephant, Renee, who arrived at the Zoo in 1982 and is estimated to be 45 years old.

# Fort Meigs State Memorial Park

Fort Meigs, a War of 1812 fort and battlefield in Perrysburg, features a reconstructed fort and museum. Under the command of future President William Henry Harrison, Fort Meigs helped defend the Northwest Territory against attacks by the British and the Native Americans during the War of 1812.

A replica of America's largest walled fort, Fort Meigs offers several reenactments featuring soldiers in period costumes throughout the year, and a number of special events, including: After Dark Lantern Tours (July 19, Sept. 28); Crossbow to Cartridge (June 29-30); Independence Day 1813 (July 4); The 60 Years' War for Ohio (Aug. 24-25): Life in Early Ohio (Sept. 21-22); Garrison Ghost Walks (Oct. 18, 19, 25, 26); The World at War – Miniature Gaming Day (Nov. 2) and a Historic Holidays – Fort Meigs Winter Festival, (Dec. 8) and more.

Canal Experience

Step back in time at the Canal Experience and get a taste of life on the Miami and Erie Canal in 1876. Providence Metropark is located in what was once the canal town of Providence, Ohio. Today, the Metropark has one of the greatest concentrations of canal-era features in the country, including:

- The Volunteer, a reproduction of a mule-drawn canal boat.
- The Isaac Ludwig Mill, a working water-powered saw and gristmill.
- More than a mile of the original Miami and Erie Canal and towpath.
- Lock #44, one of the last functioning 19th century limestone locks.
- Scenic Providence Dam, constructed across the Maumee River to maintain water levels in the canal.
- Characters in period attire welcoming visitors to a time gone by.
- Visit the Heritage Center to view The

Volunteer and Lock 44 in action. Visit Providence Metropark through October. Group reservations for tours of the Isaac Ludwig Mill welcome.

Oregon Jerusalem Historical Society

Built in 1882, the historic Brandville School has been restored and is now part

of the Oregon-Jerusalem Historical Society complex. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1994.

Brandville School houses artifacts from Native Americans who lived in the Great Black Swamp of Northwest Ohio. There is also a military room with artifacts from all the major conflicts in which the United States has been involved, dating from the War of 1812 to the present.

The Carriage House includes vignettes of the old Metzger General Store, a doctor's office and an old post office. The one-room schoolhouse will take visitors back to the turn of the 20th Century.

The historical society offers a number of special events and programs throughout the

museum complex is open Wednesdays from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. for tours, research and artifact collection. Call to arrange tours for groups tours. No charge; donations accepted.

## Harbor View Historical Society & Museum

Located in the village of Harbor View along Lake Erie, the Harbor View Historical Society and Museum continues to attract visitors from all over the country and Canada.

The society's Museum complex is situated on land originally deeded to the Ottawa chief named OTT-TO-KEE (Autokee) for his assistance to the American Forces during the War of 1812.

Located nearly 100 yards outside of the Harbor View Yacht Club entrance on Autokee Street, the museum offers a glimpse of the War of 1812 and the Battle of Lake Erie in

The British long gun and the American carronade on display are from the 2003 movie "Master and Commander: The Far Side of the World," starring Russel Crowe. The cannons allow visitors to get an up-close view of the cannons that were used at the Battle of Lake Erie in 1813. Other exhibits include "The United States Navy, Toledo from 1933 to 1997," and the nearly 100-year-old Harbor View Post Office that has provided service to the small communities on Maumee Bay.

The Museum hosts many other special attractions throughout the year.



# Historic Genoa

Among the many mercantile, entertaining, and historical treasures the Village of Genoa (founded in 1857) has to offer, the Historic Town Hall (built in 1883) is a mustsee for a variety of reasons.

Located at 509 Main St., it is classified as the oldest free-standing municipal building in Ottawa County and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

Built in the Gothic revival style, the

structure features eight ornamental chimneys and a hand-carved sandstone mask of Dionysius, the Greek God of theater, which rests over the main entrance. The first floor houses the mayor's office and the village council chambers. The second floor is used by Genoa Civic Theater.

Genoa's Old School Privy, built to serve as Genoa's first school, is believed to be the only brick outhouse on the National Register of Historic Places.

Elmore Depot

The Elmore Historical Society purchased the 1860s Elmore Depot in 1981, along with 2.5 acres of land. The society undertook an extensive renovation, and the building now houses memorabilia from Elmore's past.

In 1983, society members dismantled, relocated and rebuilt the 1860s Heckman log cabin, adding an elaborate flagstone fireplace and porch, and furnishing it with artifacts from its era.

# Schedel Arboretum & Gardens

Each year, the beauty and serenity of Schedel Arboretum & Gardens brings thousands to the 17-acre estate on the banks of the Portage River in Elmore.

The legacy of Joseph and Marie Schedel, the estate features an 1800s Manor House, upwards of 10,000 annual plants and flowers, an extensive bonsai collection and themed gardens including roses, perennials, tropicals, irises and peonies. Other highlights include a Japanese garden, two lakes, numerous water features, a working vegetable garden and a fruit tree

Schedel is also home to the Blair Museum of Lithophanes, the largest collection of the 19th-century artform in the world. The McAlear Gallery, located in the Brown Welcome Center, features art exhibits each year showcasing the works of international, national and regional artists.

## Woodville Historical Museum

Woodville Historical Museum, operated by the Woodville Historical Society, features materials and artifacts documenting the rich history of the small village located along the banks of the Portage River about 20 miles east of Toledo on US 20.

Museum visitors can learn about the 1900s oil boom, Native Americans in the Woodville area, lime plants, early schools, the Lake Shore Electric rail system that once traveled between Toledo and Cleveland, and more.

Pemberville highlights

The village of Pemberville is located on SR 105 in Wood County and rests on the forks of the Portage River.

The Pemberville Opera House is the crown jewel in properties restored and maintained by the Pemberville Historical Society. The Opera House is a "Theatre on the Second Floor." Built in 1892 and completely restored in 1999, it is one of the oldest operating opera houses in the state of Ohio. An elevator tower was added in 2016 so the theatre space is accessible to all.

The opera house is home to annual events such as the concert series "Live! In The House," the Children's Theatre Workshop, "For the Love of Art Show" and the annual Festival of Trees.

Pemberville's historic Pember-Furry House and One-Room School take visitors back in time to the 19th century. Believed to be the community's oldest existing building, the Furry House was built by village founder James Pember, and eventually was home to long-time residents Jacob H. Furry and his daughter, Minnie.

Featuring unique architectural details and authentic period furnishings, the house sits adjacent to the One Room School, where Pemberville's youth learned "readin' and writin'" at the turn of the century. pembervilleoperahouse.org

Wood County Museum

Step back in time at The Wood County Historical Center and Museum.

The Museum is the site of the former County Infirmary, which operated from 1869-1971, and became a museum in 1975.

Visitors can expect a variety of educational experiences, including several exhibit rooms depicting the original uses of the building as well as a wealth of information on the significant history of Wood County and Northwest Ohio. Among the exhibits are "Allure & Illusion: A Rose-Colored Romance," showcasing wedding dresses once worn by local community members; "For Comfort & Convenience," "A

Clean Bill of Health: Societal Response to Disease," and "Chasing the White Rabbit: An Historical Look at American Mental Illness."

The 50-acre museum grounds, maintained by the Wood County Park District, are open to the public daily.

The center also offers a variety of special programs and events throughout the year, including historical teas, several Demonstration Days, Music at the Museum presented by Visit BG July 11, Aug. 8 and Sept. 19 at 6 p.m.; Amateur Radio Field Days, June 22-23 and more.

The North Coast Veterans Museum in Gibsonburg opened in 2004 as a tribute to those who have served in the uniformed service of the United States, especially those who have lost their lives in combat or training

Military displays include weapons, uniforms, pictures, memorabilia, military accessories, tents and first aid from the Civil War to present.

The park also includes a Veterans' Memorial and a Public Safety Services Memorial. The memorial features a 36-foot, 7,000-pound antenna that sat atop the North Tower of the World Trade Center; black granite meditation seats and a One World Trade Center Sculpture. The pentagonal design is in honor of the U.S. Pentagon, and the design on the floor represents the Pennsylvania countryside and Flight 93. (Learn more at gibsonburgohio. org)

## Hayes Presidential Library & Museums

The Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Library and Museums is the nation's first Presidential library. It houses 19th U.S. President Rutherford B. Hayes' Victorian mansion, the museum, presidential library, tomb, and a mile of paved walking trails through his 25-acre wooded estate, known as Spiegel Grove.

Exhibits include interactive compo-

nents that better tell the story of President Hayes and First Lady Lucy Webb Hayes. The museum now has a Presidents Gallery, which has artifacts from other U.S. Presidents and has a replica of the Resolute Desk. The original is located in the Oval Office of the White House.

Special exhibits include "Chasing Totality: The History and Science of Eclipses," on display through Dec. 31, and beginning Sept. 27, visitors can view, "Factions and Fraternalism: A History of America's Political Parties," which will explore the dynamic ways in which Americans have sorted themselves around complex political issues, but also the shared values between the parties that enabled them to work together to propel the country forward.

The Hayes Library and Museums also offer a number of special programs and events throughout the year, including genealogy classes, outdoor Verandah Concerts in the summer, a Presidential Book Club, the Hayes Train special model train display, Horse-Drawn Sleigh Rides in Spiegel Grove during the holidays, and more.







#### Green spaces Metroparks Toledo

Metroparks Toledo preserves many of

Lucas County's most unique natural areas, from the Oak Openings to the Lake Erie coastal zone. Among local parks are: • Pearson Metropark, located at 761

Lallendorf Rd., Oregon, is one of the last remaining stands of the Great Black Swamp, a notorious forest area and swampland that once blanketed much of Northwest Ohio. The thick woods and location close to Lake Erie make Pearson a favorite stopover for a wide variety of migrating birds. Nearly 15 miles of trail in this 624-acre park provide remarkable access to the best birding anywhere. From birding to baseball to picnicking and fishing, there's something for everyone at Pearson.

Remember what life was like for those settling the Great Black Swamp in the 1860s at the Johlin Cabin, built in 1867. The cabin is part of an addition to the park, accessible from Seaman Road or the park's trail system. Known as Pearson North, this area includes an extensive wetland restoration.

• Middlegrounds Metropark, located at 111 Ottawa St. Toledo, includes a halfmile of river frontage that begins at the Anthony Wayne Bridge. The urban, 28-acre greenspace offers a 1.5-mile meandering walk/bike path and tranquil views of the Maumee River. Middlegrounds has a kayak cove with access to the river for those who bring their own boats, and a hub for the Veo Bike Share. There is also an off-leash dog area with separate fenced areas for large and small dogs.

• Glass City Metropark, located at 983 Front St., in downtown Toledo, connects East Toledo to the Maumee River and brings high-quality public greenspace, trails and programs to our riverfront. Glass City Metropark is a place to gather and celebrate as a community with adventure playgrounds, water play features, a kayak cove with an interactive boardwalk, picnic and party shelters, the Glass City Pavilion with a rooftop deck, an event lawn for up to 5,000 people, The Ribbon ice skating and roller skating trail, and the Market Hall

• Howard Marsh Metropark, 611 Howard Rd., in Curtice, showcases six miles of water trail for canoeing and kayaking and five miles of dike-top trails for

hiking and bicycling.

The Metropark, which was previously a working farm, is adjacent to the Metzger Marsh State Wildlife Area in a region that also includes Maumee Bay State Park, Magee Marsh State Wildlife Area and the Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge. Together, these local, state and federal public lands are known for their concentration of songbirds, or warblers, especially during spring migration.

The quarter-mile Madewell Trail extends into a marsh, and two overlooks provide access for fishing and viewing birds. The fishery is still being established.

For the paddler, there are two roll-off docks, kayaks available to rent by the hour using a smartphone app (Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day) and portages between marsh units.

Maumee Bay State Park at Cedar Point and North Curtice roads along the Oregon-Jerusalem Township border offers 1,336 acres and some of the finest recreational facilities in the Midwest, but also a unique natural environment created by the convergence of the land and Lake Erie.

A resort lodge and cabins, and golf course are nestled among scenic meadows, wet woods, and lush marshes. More than 300 bird species have been observed here. Families will enjoy the campground, inland lake, nature center, accessible boardwalk trail, and the Storybook Trail.

Magee Marsh Wildlife Area supports an abundance of wildlife but is probably best known as one of the top birding spots in North America for migrating songbirds, especially warblers. More than 156 species of songbirds, including 37 species of warblers, have been seen at Magee Marsh during spring and/or fall migration.

Birding at Magee Marsh can be done year-round, but the second and third week of May during the spring migration season typically provide the most diverse numbers of songbird species for bird watchers. The most popular destination is the boardwalk bird trail, located at the end of the wildlife area road.

At the Sportsmen's Migratory Bird Center (SMBC), visitors are greeted with numerous displays that depict the unique history, flora, and fauna of the area. Antique decoys, artifacts and photos provide a glimpse of the numerous waterfowl hunt clubs that once lined the lakeshore from Sandusky to Toledo, covering about 30,000 acres. A wildlife habitat display offers visitors an understanding of what lives in a wetland.

Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge provides valuable habitat for a diversity of waterfowl and other migratory birds, resident wildlife, and endangered and threatened species.

During migration seasons, the Refuge may host as many as 38 different species of warblers. The shrubs along the boardwalk and trails directly behind the Visitors Center provide excellent views of a variety of warblers and other migratory birds.

The Visitors Center welcomes guests and tells the Refuge story. Friends of Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, the nonprofit that supports the Refuge, operates a Nature Store in the Visitors Center. Proceeds from the store help to support the Refuge with education and restoration initiatives.

The Sandusky County Park District includes 16 parks and over, 2,500 acres, including Wolf Creek Park, Blue Heron Reserve, Creek Bend Farm and others. White Star Park, located south of Gibsonburg on SR 300, has a quarry up to 40-feet deep that is used by scuba divers as well as for nonpower boating and fishing, a beach and a campground located across from the park's main entrance. The park also offers two 1870s-era historical log cabins, an extensive trail system and a constructed wetland area which is excellent for birding, especially in the spring and fall.

# New Imagination Station exhibit redefines 'cardboard'

Roll up your sleeves and prepare to unbox your creativity in Imagination Station's new exhibit "Cardboard: Build Outside the Box."

"Cardboard" is an interactive, handson experience where visitors put on their construction hats and create using only cardboard. Designed by the Imagination Station team, in partnership with Welch Packaging, the exhibit is divided into six major sections. It demonstrates that with just a simple cut, fold or piece of tape, cardboard can transform into anything one can imagine.

A towering 13-foot-tall cardboard robot welcomes visitors into the exhibit. Once inside, they'll discover a 12-foot-long cardboard spaceship that will encourage them to explore many possibilities as they dive into STEAM — science, technology, engineering, art and math.

The "Cardboard Culture" area taps into your inner artist as you uncover the elements of design; "Flying into the Future" inspires you to create futuristic cars, rockets and airplanes and then race them. In "Toledo of Tomorrow," you can engineer your vision of what our city will look like in 50 years.

"Cardboard: Build Outside the Box" supports the science center's sustainability efforts by repurposing discarded cardboard for visitor activities. All the cardboard that will be used for construction in the exhibit has been previously used and given a second life.

By reusing and recycling cardboard, the new exhibit helps reduce the demand for fresh resources, conserves energy and oil and saves trees. The exhibit also inspires the community to see new ways they can reuse cardboard. Visitors will also be able to bring in cardboard for reuse and recycling. At the end of the exhibit, Welch Packaging will collect all the reused cardboard and properly recycle it.

"Our new Cardboard exhibit encompasses all of our goals as a science center," said Imagination Station Director of Education Jenny Roe. "It highlights our commitment to sustainability, tinkering, learning and community, and provides a space where everyone's imagination can come to life through cardboard. Our visitors are going to be amazed to discover how versatile this simple material is and what they can do with it."

"Cardboard: Build Outside the Box" runs through Labor Day. The exhibit is free with paid admission to the science center.


