Power plant

Oregon council to consider waterline improvement

Oregon City Council on Monday will consider additional engineering services from ARCADIS U.S. Inc., Toledo for the York Street Trunk Waterline Improvement Project.

"ARCADIS is requesting a contract increase of \$19,000," said Public Service Director Paul Roman at a committee of the whole meeting on Feb. 17.

Council will also consider entering into an agreement with Norfolk Southern Railway Company for the construction of a 24-inch trunk waterline across property owned by the railroad for the York Street Trunk Waterline Improvement Project.

Both items are part of Clean Energy Future-Oregon, LLC (CEF-O), which is developing a 955-Megawatt capacity combined cycle power generation facility within the city's municipal boundaries. It will require a supply of potable water from the nearby Toledo municipal water treatment plant.

CEF-O has entered into a potable water purchase agreement with Toledo and Oregon that will require new water infrastructure to be installed to deliver up to six million gallons per day to the project from Toledo's water plant.

Oregon hired ARCADIS U.S., Inc., for the preliminary and detailed design of the York Street Trunk Waterline Improvement Project.

In order to serve the Clean Energy Future-Oregon, LLC Project, the city will construct a 24-inch waterline within a 42-inch steel casing pipe across a portion of property owned by Norfolk Southern Railway Company, which is located along York Street just west of Lallendorf Road.

In order to construct the 24-inch waterline, an agreement is needed between Oregon and the Norfolk Southern Railway Company.

Design and bidding services were authorized in May, 2019. The project was closely coordinated with the City of Oregon, Toledo, utility companies, and CEF-O. Design was completed and Ohio EPA approved the plans in late January

The cost to construct the 24-inch raw water pipeline across property owned by the railroad is \$46,000. The cost of the work was approved in the 2020 municipal budget.

Start up operation

The \$900 million natural gas-fired electric power plant will be located on N. Lallendorf Road. It will be the second natural gas-fired electric power plant in the city. The first, Oregon Clean Energy, is located on a 30-acre parcel on N. Lallendorf Road. Startup operations of the \$900 million facility is expected this year.

Similar to Oregon Clean Energy, the plant will have a cooling tower that would require about 3.5 million gallons of untreated water daily from Lake Erie and would dissipate about 85 percent of that into the atmosphere during the cooling process. The rest would be piped to the city's wastewater treatment plant.

Also, council will consider the following items on Monday:

- An ordinance to purchase a 2020 Ford F-250 4 x 4 pickup truck with snow plow, for \$37,226.56 from Mathews Ford, Oregon, to be used in the fire/rescue department. It would replace the fire department's 2007 GMC Sierra pickup and 2005 Ford Explorer. The vehicle will be used for towing multiple trailers, including the HazMat trailer, the air trailer, both boats in the fire department, the lawn trailer and other equipment. It will also be used for snow removal at all three stations. "We think it's a good value with a local vendor,"

Firefighters lauded for efforts after crash

Five members of the Lake Township Fire Department were recognized Tuesday for their efforts during a fatal accident Dec. 14 involving their vehicle.

Dave DeVore, Manny Alvarez, Forrest Wagner and Matt DeGroff were presented certificates of commendation from the Ohio

House of Representatives by Rep. Haraz Ghanbari. Todd Osborn will also receive a certificate but wasn't at the presentation.

Fire chief Bruce Moritz praised the men who were en route to a fire Dec. 14 on State Rt. 795 when their pumper engine hit a car that had swerved across the centerline after hitting a vehicle from behind that had stopped for the pumper. The driver of the vehicle that collided with the pumper later died and his passenger suffered seri-

ous injuries. Occupants of the third vehicle also were injured.

The chief said the firefighters suffered injuries but immediately attempted to help the occupants of the other vehicles.

"It was a horrific crash," he said, crediting the pumper driver, DeVore, for keeping the fire truck on the road and not rolling it over into the ditch along the road. "But

said City Administrator Mike Beazley;

•A resolution declaring it necessary to improve North Norden Road from about 300 feet north of Seaman Road to approximately 2,050 feet north of Seaman Road by the installation of a sanitary sewer. The improvement has been petitioned by the owners of 59.59 percent of the lots and lands to be assessed for the project;

•The purchase from Mathews Ford, Oregon, of a 2020 Ford F-150 4x4 Truck to be used by the wastewater treatment plant in the department of public service for \$30,910.28. Mathews provided a quote that was \$308.72 lower than the Ohio STS Program for the truck, according to Public Service Director Paul Roman. The wastewater treatment plant will use the truck for general support, maintenance, and operation. City council appropriated the necessary funds required to purchase the truck in the 2020 municipal budget.

Also at the committee of the whole meeting, Beazley provided an update on the development of the town center.

“The city has prepared requests for proposals for engineering for moving south of Harbor Drive. It’s something we’ve been working on for a while. We’re excited about taking those steps. So we’re starting to see some things develop,” said Beazley.

they went from going to fight a fire to taking care of people.”

The chief said all of the township’s first responders were dedicated.

“We don’t know what we’re going to face,” he said, adding firefighters had recently spent 12 hours fighting a structure fire in the township. “We have a great group of people here. I’d take them anytime.”

The crowd of families and friends filled the meeting room of the township trustees and burst into applause after Rep. Ghanbari presented the certificates.

He said the Ohio house has approved a bill that would remove a physical injury requirement for first responders suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder to receive workers’ compensation benefits. The bill is pending in the senate.

Missing children program starting

The Lake Township Police Officers Association has partnered with area truckers and refueling stations to purchase seven signs that will alert motorists to missing children from Northwest Ohio.

The signs, which will be posted at the stations, read: “This establishment joins Lake Township Police in efforts to locate missing and endangered children. If you have seen any of the children on these posters please call 419-666-5500 to provide any info you have.”

A 2-foot by 3-foot board to display photos of nine missing children will accompany the signs, said Ron Craig, the township community policing officer, and new photos and information will be posted weekly.

Officer Craig said deputies from the Lucas County Sheriff’s Office have met with the township police department to discuss how the departments can collaborate on the program.

Township police chief Mark Hummer said his department will target youngsters missing from the area, working with the Ohio Attorney General’s Office and the Center for Missing and Exploited Children

to keep up-to-date information posted on the boards.

“We have garnered the support of the Ohio Attorney General’s Office and the Center for Missing and Exploited Children,” chief Hummer said. “Also on board are Truckers Against (Human) Trafficking, and the Toledo Trucking Association.”

Art museum presents "The Art of the Cut"

The Toledo Museum of Art (TMA) Peristyle will be turned into a community barbershop Sunday, March 1, with local black barbers demonstrating their artistic abilities as they perform haircuts inspired by the past and present and visions for the future.

"The Art of the Cut," which runs from 3-6 p.m., examines the intersection of art and health while celebrating local black barbers and their roles as artists and men's wellness advocates. The event is presented by Circle, a Museum affinity group whose diverse, civically and culturally engaged members work with TMA to develop innovative ways of connecting the Toledo community with the Museum and with art.

"Last year, 'The Art of the Cut' event filled the GlasSalon to capacity, so this year we moved the event to accommodate the community and showcase the barbers on the historic Peristyle stage," said Maria lafelice, youth and family programs manager. "'The Art of the Cut' demonstrates the intersection between art and health, and we are excited to bring hundreds of people together to see how TMA, the barbershops and ProMedica are working together to improve community wellness."

These predominantly African American barbershops are among the participants in ProMedica's Barbershop Health and Wellness Program, which provides barbers education on prostate cancer and other screenings as well as health educational materials for barbers to distribute to their clients.

"The barbershop program is about fostering trusting relationships between the community and health care providers while providing health screenings, health education and resource information," said ProMedica Cancer Institute Community Liaison Robin Charney, who leads the program. "The response from the barbers has been phenomenal. They have the ear and the trust of the community and have allowed us to expand our health education and screening efforts."

The event will be co-hosted by barbers from Da Shop, Victory, Groomed, Tal-Mon, Fletcher's Hair Design, Steve's Sport-n-Cuts and Foster's Hair Concepts Unlimited.

The live barbering showcase will feature entertainment throughout the Peristyle Theater with a cash bar and food available for purchase. The event is free, but registration is encouraged. Outage notifications

Columbia Gas is encouraging customers to sign up for outage alerts.

The new alert notifications allow customers to stay up to date about unplanned natural gas outages through text messages, email and/or an automated phone call. The Press wins

The Press won second place in its three-part series, "Are we saving Lake Erie?," for the In-depth reporting category of the Ohio News Media Association's Hooper contest.

The judge's comment on the series stated the following: "This is an ambitious and very well conducted overview of the environmental problems facing Lake Erie's southwestern shore. The reporting covers many different aspects of the problem, is very well sourced, and is reasonably well written. Overall, it is a very good example of in-depth reporting."

On Aug. 2, 2014, the City of Toledo issued a tap water ban for three days after a toxin, microcystin, was found in its water supply. A high level of microcystin, created by blue green algae, was detected in samples taken from the city's water treatment plant in East Toledo.

The plant draws its water from the western basin of Lake Erie, the 12th largest freshwater lake in the world. The toxin, at high levels, can cause abnormal liver functions in humans and animals.

The Press examined the causes of the toxic algae and how Northwest Ohio was dealing with the crisis. The series, "Saving Lake Erie," published in January, 2015, took an in-depth look at the challenges that lay ahead to restore health to Lake Erie. As we approached the fifth year anniversary of the Toledo water crisis, The Press revisited the event in a three-part series, "Are we saving Lake Erie?" published in the August editions of the newspaper.

Updated Action Plan

The Ohio Lake Erie Commission will host a webinar on Feb. 24 to answer questions about the draft Ohio Domestic Action Plan 2020 that was released on Jan. 28.

The Ohio Domestic Action Plan 2020 is a plan to reduce phosphorus entering Lake Erie under the binational Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement. This draft Ohio plan is a continuation of the Western Basin of Lake Erie Collaboration Implementation Framework finalized by the State of Ohio in early 2017 and supports Governor DeWine's H2Ohio plan, which was released in November 2019.

The webinar will be held from 4-5 p.m. on Feb. 24. To register and join the webinar, visit: lakeerie.ohio.gov and click the link to the webinar.

The Ohio Lake Erie Commission will finalize the update of the Ohio Domestic Action Plan 2020 in coordination with Ohio EPA, Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA), Ohio Department of Health (ODH) and Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), which each share responsibility for implementing the plan.

OLEC was established to preserve Lake Erie's natural resources, protect the quality of its waters and ecosystem and promote economic development in the region. The director of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (Ohio EPA) serves as the commission's chairman. Additional members include the directors of the state departments of Transportation, Health, Development Services, Agriculture, Natural Resources and five additional members appointed by Governor Mike DeWine.

Water tank planned for township

The Wood County Water and Sewer District has begun preliminary site work for an elevated water tank in Lake Township.

District-owned property along Lemoyne Road is being considered for a new tank, Theresa Pollick, a spokesperson for the district, said.

A new tank will provide critical water storage capacity to areas supplied with water to the district from the City of Toledo, including Walbridge, Rossford, part of Northwood and townships in Northern Wood County, Pollick said, adding that a new tank will enhance flow and pressure and provide additional storage in the event of an emergency in the system.

The district also sees a new water tank as a support for economic development in the northern section of the county.

The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency recommends that at least one day usage supply of water be available in elevated storage tanks.

Mark Hummer, township administrator, reported to the township trustees last week, that the district was conducting soil bore tests at the site along Lemoyne.

purchase books and magazines for research in water sciences.

Eastwood High School – \$500 for water quality testing kits for marine science class, and \$500 for testing kits and waders to support existing stream monitoring programs in the College Credit Plus Program through the environmental science class.

Otsego High School – \$500 for testing supplies and tools to research bacteria in a local creek.

Otsego Junior High School – \$100 for waders for an educator to attend the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Government Student Watershed Watch.

Otsego Kindergarten – \$500 for rain-water collection barrels and collection bottles to teach small children the importance of water conservation.

Lake Middle School – \$500 for a 7th-grade science project to research the use of algae as a biofuel.

Ducks Unlimited, partners invest in restoration projects

Ducks Unlimited and its partners last year invested \$2.1 million to enhance 2,480 acres of wetlands and grasslands in Ohio, according to the organization, including a project at the Ottawa County Wildlife Refuge.

“Ohio’s wetlands play a significant role for Great Lakes continental waterfowl,” said Russ Terry, a regional biologist for Ducks Unlimited. “But our wetlands are also crucial for water quality. Ohio has lost 90 percent of its wetlands, which help filter rain water before it enters the Great Lakes. The more wetlands we can put back on the landscape, the better for ducks and residents.”

DU has purchased two former agricultural properties adjacent to the wildlife refuge and will turn them over to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service once they are restored. In all, the properties cover about 75 acres.

The habitat is being restored to provide migratory and breeding habitat in the western Lake Erie basin and help reduce nutrient runoff reaching the lake that contributes to algal bloom outbreaks.

- Other highlights of 2019 include:
- Using a \$490,000 grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act to restore or enhance at least 250 acres of wetlands and 250 acres of upland native warm season grasslands on private property in Northwest Ohio over the next three years.
 - Acquiring nearly 720 acres to estab-

lish the Andreoff Wildlife Area in Hardin County. Ducks Unlimited and Energy Transfer helped the Ohio Division of Wildlife secure the land, which is open for recreation.

- Restoring 54 acres of floodplain wetlands adjacent to Green Creek at Pickrel Creek Wildlife Area in Sandusky County. The project included planting 1,025 three-gallon container trees and shrubs and 10,000 bare-root trees. More than 20 species of wildlife-friendly trees and shrubs were planted. Funding came from the division of wildlife, North American Wetlands Conservation Act and Cargill Deicing Technology – Cleveland Mine Facility.

In all, Ducks Unlimited and partners undertook 21 projects last year in Ohio. Other partners include National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration, Metroparks Toledo, corporations and other donors.

Ducks Unlimited also was a partner in the development of Howard Marsh Metropark, which opened in 2018.

Since 2013, the partners had worked to restore the 1,000-acre former agricultural land back to wetlands and other habitat to benefit ducks, fish and other wildlife, and provide recreational opportunities.

Visitors can enjoy six miles of dike-top walking trails around the marsh units and a quarter mile of boardwalk through the wetlands. About seven miles of navigable water and two kayak launch docks are available for paddlers.

Show appreciation for police, says councilmember

The way Vicky Canales-Pratt sees it, the Village of Walbridge is a safe place to live and raise a family and the officers of the police department deserve much of the credit for making it so.

Canales-Pratt, a member of village council and chairman of the Personnel and Human Resources Committee, recently floated the idea of rewarding officers periodically with a free soft drink or cup of coffee or maybe even lunch to show the public’s appreciation for the work the officers do.

“We have one officer that is on active duty overseas now,” she said. “The other officers are all working together and we want to show that we appreciate them and everything they do. You do a better job when you’re appreciated. I went to the dollar store and saw two people left their cars running in the parking lot while they went into the store. They felt that safe.”

Canales-Pratt said she plans to contact the owners of The Skillet restaurant and 7-11 convenience store in the village to see if they would be “on board” with her idea.

Other members of the committee, Larry Boday and Karen Baron, have expressed support, she said, but it will likely take a vote of council to approve it as revenues from the general fund would be needed.

“I have to touch base with the administration about the funding,” Canales-Pratt said.

She is also working on a design for the cards that would be used by the officers.





Recognition, thanks – not abuse – needed for high school officials

While the behavior of parents and other fans at high school games is still a work in progress, there is some good news on the officiating front.

Last fall, we reported on a growing shortage of officials nationwide – even reaching a crisis stage in some areas as games were being cancelled. Through a nationwide recruitment effort, progress is being made in attracting more people to the high school officiating avocation.

Thanks to the National Federation of High School Association's #BecomeAnOfficial campaign that was launched in the spring of 2017, more than 4,000 men and women across the country have registered and become certified officials. Many of these individuals are former high school athletes who want to remain involved in sports, earn some extra income and stay in shape, including first responders such as police officers, firefighters and EMTs.

Individuals interested in becoming an official can sign up through the www.HighSchoolOfficials.com website, and most state associations respond within 24 hours to continue the registration process.

On the flip side, however, is the fear that any gains in new officials coming in



the front door are being offset by other officials heading out the back door because of the continued boorish behavior on the part of parents and other fans.

Rickey Neaves, associate director of the Mississippi High School Activities Association, is struggling to cover all basketball games in his state in his role as officials' coordinator.

"Fans and coaches alike feel freer to downgrade officials, and holler and scream at them, as opposed to the way it was 10 years ago," Neaves said. "You can see where it is getting worse and worse with parents and coaches blaming officials or staying on an official to the point where they're just not going to take it, so they just get out."

Unfortunately, we continue to hear reports like this from across the country. A recent survey conducted by Officially Human: Behind the Stripes that was completed by about 19,000 respondents in 14 states

indicated that the problem persists, with fans who do not know the rules being the main culprit.

If efforts by the NFHS at the national level – and others at state and local levels – to attract more people to officiating are to be successful, unsportsmanlike behavior on the part of parents and other fans must cease or we will lose some of these new officials within two years.

While we recognize the task of improving the culture at high school events is challenging and is one more item on the busy plates of school administrators, it is essential if we are to retain officials.

Brenda Hilton, founder of Officially Human: Beyond the Stripes, said "The time is now for all of us to realize that officials are human and their existence and hard work at sporting events allows all of us to enjoy the games that we love. We must start to humanize officials now before the whistles fall silent."

Recognition and thanks should also be a part of the game plan. We must regularly share our appreciation for the men and women who officiate high school sports.

Dana Pappas, commissioner of officials for the New Mexico Officials Association, shared the following with officials in her state during a special appreciation week:

"Never think that what you do as an official doesn't matter because it does. Never let one contest where the fans are exceedingly brutal and the scrutiny is overly intense derail your love for what you do. Never think that you are not making a difference because you most definitely are. You are educators, role models and guardians of the integrity of the sport you officiate. You officiate because you care about kids, you care about your chosen sport and you care about your community."

Instead of viewing these officiating issues as a crisis, let's see them as an opportunity to impact lives through education-based athletics.

Dr. Karissa L. Niehoff is in her second year as executive director of the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) in Indianapolis, Indiana. She is the first female to head the national leadership organization for high school athletics and performing arts activities and the sixth full-time executive director of the NFHS, which celebrated its 100th year of service during the 2018-19 school year. She previously was executive director of the Connecticut Association of Schools-Connecticut Interscholastic Athletic Conference for seven years.

Weighing the levy

To the editor: Before the March 17 levy election in the Oregon School District, voters should know the most recent contract with the teachers' union gave a total increase of 8.6 percent between now and 2022 and in November a vote was taken to increase the salaries of seven different job classifications.

The last annual 5-year forecast indicated the money would not be there. From the 2015/2016 school year through last school year the district report card showed grades of mostly C or below except for the 2017/18 year. This includes four F's, six D's and 5 C's. The only category where an "A" was obtained and maintained during the entire four year reporting period is the graduation rate.

The "Prepared for Success" category indicates a grade of D for the years 2015-17 and a grade of F for the last two reported years. Does this mean the schools are just passing students through with little or no skills to succeed in life?

The 2018 Ohio Department of Education's district profile report states that Oregon's salaries for teachers are more than \$1,500 above the state average and almost \$3,000 above similar districts. Oregon administrators have a salary almost \$11,000 above both the state average and similar districts.

The 23.27 percent of operating expenditures spent by Oregon for fringe benefits is another area where Oregon is above the state average by 2.2 percent and 1.63 percent above similar districts. The salaries which account for 58.73 percent of operating expenditures spent by the district are 5.48 percent above the state average and 3.59 percent above similar districts (2018 ODE) and do not even take into account additional contract raises and the 2 percent step increases.

Since it is my understanding several administrators do not even live in Oregon, I wonder if they fully appreciate what this levy will do to the citizens of Oregon 65 years old and older.

"Hands-Free" bill merits support

To the editor: Ohio Governor Mike DeWine is urging state legislators to pass a bipartisan bill sponsored by Sen. Stephanie Kunze, R-Hilliard, and Sen. Sean O'Brien, D-Bazetta, that would drastically change Ohio's distracted driving law.

I urge all state legislators to quickly pass this legislation.

The bill, being touted as the "Hands-Free Ohio" bill, changes current law in many ways, but the most significant change regards distracted driving while using cell phones, changing the violation from a secondary offense to a primary offense.

Law enforcement may not initiate a traffic stop for just a secondary offense, but can for a primary offense. In other words, if an officer observes a driver committing a secondary offense, the driver must also commit a primary offense to give the officer probable cause to pull that driver over.

If passed and signed into law, the bill also changes the legality of how drivers handle cell phones. Currently, using a hand-held wireless communications device to write, send, or read a text message is a secondary offense for adults, with a possible fine of \$150.

The bill would make it a primary offense for anyone who uses a hand-held com-

munications device to write, read, or send a text message while driving, in addition to watching or recording videos, taking photos or looking at images, live streaming, using apps, entering information into GPS navigation programs, dialing phone numbers, and/or holding a phone for a phone call.

The bill will also increase fines for drivers who habitually use such devices while driving. A first offense will result in a \$150 fine, but a second offense within a three-year period would increase that fine to \$250, and a third offense calls for a \$500 fine. Additionally, a first offense will get a driver two points on their record, and a second and third offense would result in 3 and 4 points, respectively.

There are exemptions built into the bill for using hand-held cell phones to make emergency calls, for using devices while in a stationary position outside a lane of traffic, and in a hands-free mode to talk on the phone. To use any device for GPS purposes, the data must first be entered before driving begins, and the device may not be held or supported by the driver's body.

There are those in law enforcement who have professed for some time that distracted driving will continue to injure and kill people as long as it is only a secondary offense and until it "hurts people in the wallet." This bill accomplishes both.

Distracted driving is quickly becoming a major cause of vehicle crashes in Ohio and across the country. It is time we all take this problem seriously and do more to stop the scourge that is injuring and killing people on our highways.

Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation offers \$70,000+ in agriculture scholarships

The Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation is offering more than \$70,000 in scholarships, available to Ohio students from rural, suburban and urban communities who are pursuing degrees connected in some way to agriculture.

Approximately 50 scholarships, will be awarded through 10 programs. The deadline to apply online at offb.org/foundation is Feb. 28 and all applications require letters of recommendation, an essay, school transcripts and photos.

The Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation Scholar award recognizes students for academic effort, community service and career interests that use agriculture to enhance the partnership between producers and consumers in rural, suburban and/or urban settings.

- The foundation's Women's Leadership in Agriculture Scholarship Program is awarded to applicants who may not be majoring in agriculture directly, but whose chosen career field will benefit a field related to agriculture or community development such as food production, scientific research, education/outreach, marketing, policymaking, advocacy or leadership development. The program was established by an endowment from the Charlotte R. Schmidlapp Fund, Fifth Third Bank, Trustee.

- The scholarship's namesake John C. "Jack" Fisher believes in this saying from Ohio Farm Bureau's first executive vice president Murray Lincoln: "People have within their own hands the tools to fashion their own destiny." His vision for this scholarship is to enable people to acquire the necessary tools for a more fulfilling life. Funding for this scholarship comes from the contributions made through the Fisher Fund for Lifelong Learning.

- Known as "Mr. Farm Bureau" to his family and friends, Kenny Walter devoted 34 years of his life to Ohio Farm Bureau. The Kenny Walter Scholarship Fund is awarded to students pursuing post-secondary education in agriculture who come from a Farm Bureau family in the 29 northeastern counties Walter covered as a regional supervisor and organization director.

- The Darwin Bryan Scholarship Fund was established in 1985 in honor of Darwin R. Bryan whose enthusiastic leadership during his 37 years of service to Ohio Farm Bureau has been an inspiration to rural youths throughout Ohio. The scholarship fund assists students who have been active in the Farm Bureau youth program and/or whose parents are Farm Bureau members.

- The Cindy Hollingshead Scholarship Fund was established in 2011 to honor Cynthia Anne (Cindy) Hollingshead for her 39 years of service as executive secretary of Ohio Farm Bureau, as well as a lifetime of volunteer commitment to local government and community service activities. The objective of the scholarship fund is to assist students who plan to pursue careers focusing on agriculture, community service or association leadership.

In addition, the Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation is offering four new scholarship opportunities this year:

- The Richard & Carole Cocks Scholarship is intended to recognize those students who come from those areas that provide so much through farming. This scholarship will award annually four scholarships of \$2,500 to deserving students from select rural Ohio counties. Each scholarship award is renewable for up to four years and a total of \$10,000 per student.

- The Ohio Horsemen's Benevolent & Protective Association Scholarship. The Ohio Horsemen's Benevolent & Protective Association is a nonprofit trade association representing 2,500 thoroughbred owners and trainers who race at Ohio's three commercial Thoroughbred race tracks. The objective of the scholarship fund is to assist students who plan to pursue careers focusing on food or agriculture.

- The Dr. David A. Benfield Scholarship Fund was established in 2019 by colleagues and friends of Dr. Benfield to honor his 17-year career as associate director of OARDC and associate vice president and director of the Wooster Campus in the College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences and his passion for agricultural education and research. The scholarship is specifically for students in livestock and crop sciences at ATI. The purpose of this scholarship fund is to provide \$1000 to students entering their second year at Ohio State ATI that are enrolled in livestock and crop related majors.

- The Joseph Kelly Memorial Scholarship was established in 2018 to honor the life of Joseph Kelly and to continue his legacy of generosity and service. The Joseph Kelly Memorial Scholarship is an annual, merit-based competition that focuses on rewarding students pursuing degrees related to agriculture.

Terra State: Physical Therapy Assistant program earns 10-year accreditation

The Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) program at Terra State Community College recently received a 10-year reaffirmation on its accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE).

In order for students to be eligible to take the board exam to earn their PTA license, they must get their education at a CAPTE-accredited institution. This accreditation is affirmation from the Commission that Terra State is substantially demonstrating compliance with all of their standards.

"This should be something we're really proud of; I know I am," said PTA Program Chair Melissa Patrizi.

The accreditation reaffirmation process included a self-study report submission by the PTA program, which explains how the program demonstrates compliance with all of the standards that the commission outlined. Once that was submitted, Terra State's on-site team reviewed it and visited campus to verify the program was doing what they said in the report. The team met with the college president, deans, vice presidents, program chairs, instructors, financial aid, admissions, alumni and students.

"Our on-site team was from all around the country and when they walked into our PTA lab, jaws dropped," Patrizi said. "They have seen many labs between the three of them and they were absolutely floored by our lab, our equipment and the space we have for our students."

The self-study report was submitted in January 2019, on-site visits happened in early March 2019 and the information went before the commission in October 2019, which is when the commission read through Terra State's report, the on-site team's report and Terra State's response to the on-site team report.

Patrizi displayed the CAPTE ac-

creditation at the College's January 2020 Board of Trustees meeting.

Vice President of Academic Affairs Bill Taylor said, "A lot of work was put into this accreditation and, with the help of Dr. Patrizi's leadership, we came together as a team and made it happen. With great faculty and a fantastic lab, we are proud that we can offer such an outstanding PTA program for students."

Moving forward, the PTA program must submit reports regularly to the Commission ensuring continuing compliance with the standards and required elements and will receive a formal visit in 10 years.





Administrator resigns

On Jan. 30, Terra State Community College administrator Jerry Buccilla submitted his resignation effective Feb. 28, after he was placed on administrative leave since Jan. 9.

The decision to place Buccilla on administrative leave was a result of interactions with him subsequent to a misdemeanor assault charge levied against Buccilla in August 2019.

Buccilla was hired by the college in 2019 as head men's basketball coach, athletic director and co-interim vice-president of financial affairs.



- Collages: must be two dimensional.
- Prints: lithographs, silkscreen, block prints.
- Mixed media: use of more than two mediums such as pencil, ink, etc.
- Computer-generated art.

• Photography.
All entries must meet the following criteria:

- The submission must be two dimensional.
- If selected as the winning piece, artwork must arrive in Washington, D.C., framed.
- The submission must be no larger than 26 inches high, 26 inches wide, and 4 inches deep, including the frame. It also must have a wire attached to the back suitable for hanging on a wall.
- The submission must not weigh more than 15 pounds.
- The submission must be original in concept, design, and execution and may not violate any U.S. copyright laws. It is recommended that charcoal and pastel drawings be fixed. Work entered must be in the original medium; that is, not a scanned reproduction of a painting or drawing. Framing rules apply only to the winning artwork.





Eastwood Alumni Assn. inducts five into “Eagle Way” Hall of Fame





• **Mike Gardner**, a 1968 Eastwood graduate, holds the most varsity letters in Eastwood history with 13. He has been the Eastwood boys golf coach for 48 years and Eastwood educator for 41 years. He has also been a basketball scorekeeper for 34 years at

Eastwood.

• **Dr. Lisa Lattanza**, who graduated from Eastwood in 1981, is the Chair of the Department of Orthopedic Surgery and Rehab at Yale School of Medicine. A world-renowned leader in 3-D surgical planning and technology for deformity correction, she is co-founder of the Perry Initiative, named after her mentor and friend, Dr. Jacquelin Perry. 

After winning district, Jurski competes at state meet

Clay sophomore Joslyn Jurski won a Division I district championship, qualifying for the state meet in the 200 yard freestyle. The state meet was held Feb. 19-22 at C.T. Branin Natatorium in Canton.

Clay senior Reuben Hagedorn set a school record in the 100 freestyle, placing 19th with a time of 49.51 and placed 15th in the 50 freestyle with a time of 22.25.

For Oak Harbor, junior Elayna Krupp qualified for the D-II state meet in the 50 freestyle (24.32) and the 100 butterfly (59.68).

Oak Harbor also sent its 200 medley relay (1:51.1) and the 200 freestyle relay (1:40.04). Krupp, Erin Druyor, Emily Haar, and Amelia Mizelle swam for both relay teams at districts and at state.

In the D-II boys meet, Oak Harbor sent three relay teams, including its 200 medley (1:41.13), the 200 freestyle (1:28.75), and the 400 freestyle (3:19.06). Oak Harbor junior Troy Metcalf qualified individually in the 50 freestyle (22.22).

Eagles bounced at state duals, but ready to move on

Eastwood wrestling made its first trip to the Division III state duals meet, and even though the Eagles lost in the quarter-final round, they felt confident about the wrestlers chances going into the Northern Buckeye Conference meet at Woodmore High School and the upcoming individual tournaments.

Although it was Eastwood's first time at the state dual tournament, an unofficial state dual meet was held before the OHSAA set up its sanctioned tournament.

So, in a way, Eastwood had been here before, but that was a different group of wrestlers.

"Back in 2007, we won it that year, but it was picked differently, so we were pretty good back then when we beat (St. Paris) Graham that year and we had a couple runners-up to Graham, too," said Eastwood coach Joe Wyant.

In a 43-28 loss to No. 5 seed Brookville at Ohio State University's St. John Arena, things started really well for the No. 4 seeded Eagles, winning five of the first six weight classes, including three by pin.

Eastwood freshman Callen Young pinned Brookville freshman Brycen Dull in 1:08 at 120 pounds, sophomore Gavin Owens pinned freshman Timmy Davis in 36 seconds at 126 and junior Brandon Hahn pinned junior Mason Esterline in 3:16 at 132.

In the other two early round victories, Eastwood junior Bryce Maynard won a 13-2 major decision over senior Bailey Larson and sophomore Xavier Escobedo won 6-2 against junior Brennon Moore. However, Brookeville would take seven of the next eight weight classes. Eastwood junior Jimmy Recknagel was the Eagles' only other winner, defeating sophomore Dylan Starnes, 7-5.

Brookville lost to state powerhouse and top seeded Edison, 56-15, in the semi-finals and the Chargers went on to a 57-14 state championship win over Apple Creek Wynedale.

Eastwood's season has been a success, too, and getting even better.

"We've been doing very well. Went to a tournament at Waterloo, finished second there, and then we went to West Jefferson — we won that against mostly Division II and III schools. We went to Ashland Crestview for a dual meet tournament — we did lose two duals there and finished third. And then, we went to Lima Central Catholic's Thunderbird Tournament and we finished third there among 47 teams, so we've done really well," Wyant said.

Besides Hahn, returning state qualifiers are sophomore Gavin Owens, who was 47-3 and finished second at 106 pounds, and junior Bryce Maynard, who was 39-13 a year ago at 113 pounds. This year, Owens is 37-4 mostly at 120 and Maynard is 38-5 at 113.

We've had some others kids step up. We have seven kids with over 30 wins and two

more that have 28 wins, so we've had some pretty good success this year individually. And then, we've got some freshmen in the line-up who are hanging in there tough. We think we've got around five, six guys who have a good shot of qualifying for state when they have a good day at districts," Wyant said.

Other starters are freshman Cody Perkins (7-10) at 106, sophomore Xavier Escobedo (31-12) at 132, senior Mason Glaze (33-11) at 138, freshman Bryce Hesselbart (28-6) at 145, junior Jimmy Recknagel (31-7) at 152, freshman Dalton Hesselbart (17-21) at 160, senior Ross Beaverson (31-10) at 170, freshman Joey Grzegorzcyk (15-21) at 182, sophomore Tyler Bowman (22-12) at 220 and senior Austen Nissen (26-10) at 285.

Clay wrestling poised with depth, plenty of talent

When Clay senior Ben Richmond pinned Perrysburg senior Ethan Morley with one minute remaining in their Division I 285-pound regional semifinal match, it created an uproar.

As Richmond closed the deal, the Clay coaching staff was jumping up and down in hysteria. The win secured a 32-29 Clay victory over a cross town team that has become their rival.

It was the second straight year Clay performed that trick — last year the Yellow Jackets defeated the Eagles at Defiance's Frickers Duals but Clay got them back in the regional dual tournament semifinals in similar fashion.

Clay coach Ralph Cubberly calls the Clay-Perrysburg rivalry "a good thing," making Richmond's win that much more important.

"It was big. It was a battle. It was a slugfest," Cubberly said. "They are good — they have good guys, we have good guys. We punched them, they punched us and we punched them back. It came down to the very end."


That sent Clay to the regional final against state powerhouse Elyria, which is ranked 11th in the nation. In six of eight years of the regional dual meet, Clay and Elyria have wrestled for a regional dual championship but Elyria seems to have the edge. Only the first year Clay defeated Elyria and advanced to state, and the other two years Perrysburg defeated Clay on the way to the finals.

This year, Elyria once again defeated the Eagles, 56-15, despite Clay winning the first two matches. Elyria went on to become state runner-up, losing the championship to Lakewood St. Edward, 36-30.

Entering the Three Rivers Athletic Conference championships, Clay might not have needed so much fanfare in their final match to win a championship. Clay had won seven of eight TRAC championships entering last weekend's wrestling and was in good shape to add another title to their résumé.

Clay was already stacked with depth heading into the TRAC championships with eight wrestlers already having 30 or more wins and another seven on the verge of getting there. Not all of them are on the varsity Gold team. Some are on the Green team, but all wrestle varsity competition, not junior varsity.

Gold wrestlers with 30-plus wins are Jacob Meek (39-4) at 220, Mike Daly (30-9) at 132, Tyler Weseman (30-12) at 160, Jacob Moon (30-3) at 113 and Micah Medina (30-11) at 106. Poised are Ty Cobb (195) at 29-9, Nick Rodriguez (113) at 29-

4, Dominico Migliori (28-10) at 145 and Tony Pendergraff (120) at 27-10. Moon, Pendergraff, Meek and Cobb are returning state qualifiers.

Meek leads the team in pins (26) and Daly and Migliori have 20 each. Moon, who placed third at state as a sophomore last year, leads the team in technical falls with six and Weseman follows with five and Weseman has the most match points (262) followed by Meek (233).

Other Gold starters include Austin Thompson (126) at 22-13, Deakon Rivera (21-10) at 138, Kameron Miller (18-11) at 132, Richmond (17-15) and Isaac Sevrá (14-7) at 170.

They already have team wins in the Dublin Scioto Tournament, Tiffin Calvert's Gene Kimmet Memorial and the Elmwood Duals two weeks ago. Cubberly says it's been about building his wrestlers confidence.

In Dublin, finishing first were Medina, Daly, Rodriguez, Thompson, Migliori and Meek. Cobb was runner-up, Pendergraff placed third and placing fifth were Miller

and Weseman.

At the Elmwood Duals, Clay rolled through the competition, defeating Bryan (71-9), Rossford (64-18), Bowling Green (56-22), Bellevue (59-18), St. Marys (63-18), Northwood (60-15) and Woodward (70-12).

'Second half of the season'

At the Kimmet Memorial, placing first was Rodriguez, Moon and Thompson, Weseman and Migliori were runner-up, and Logan Werner (170) and Richmond placed third. There were some nationally prominent events where the numbers don't look as good, but if you look who they are wrestling, you'd think otherwise.

"We wrestle in big tournaments like the Maumee Bay (Classic), Brecksville and Solon — those are some big, tough tournaments. They are hard to win. But, you know, we're doing fine. We're peaking at the right time. We're wrestling really well right now," Cubberly said.

At the Maumee Bay Classic, hosted by Clay, the Eagles finished seventh out of 48 teams with 133 points. Moon placed sec-

ond, Meek was third, Cobb placed fifth and Daly placed eighth.

At the Brecksville Holiday Tournament, Clay finished 23rd, scoring 63 points. Medina and Meek finished fifth and Cobb placed eighth.

"We've kind of got our wrestlers set up to where we really test our kids in the first half at the Maumee Bay, and then we kind of back off a little bit the last couple weeks to get our kids in some tournaments they can actually do well in so we can build their confidence going into the league tournaments, the state duals, the sectionals and districts — our kids are not beat up, they've been battle-tested in the other big tournaments, and we get our kids healthy and ready to roll for what we call 'the second half of the season.'"

At the Solon Invitational, Moon, Meek and Cobb placed first. Moon also wrestled at Walsh Jesuit's prestigious Iron Man Tournament, finishing fourth against some of the best in the nation.

At this year's Frickers Duals, Clay went 9-1, losing only to Division III state dual champion Edison, 39-24. Wins were over Avon, Richmond (Ind.), Hudson (Mich.), Elmwood, Uniontown Lake, Archbold, Romeo (Mich.), Miami Trace and Tinora.

No forfeits here

This is a team that has 36 wrestlers on its roster, and three Green team wrestlers have also reached 30 wins going against varsity competition. They include Lucas Fraiser (36-8), Ashtin Latta (33-10), and Austin Smith (30-8).

These are guys Cubberly says are always in position to take over a starting role or can step right in if someone gets hurt. There will be no weight class forfeits when Clay is on the mat — it's more like, if you are a wrestler, where do you fit in on the depth chart?

Other top Green wrestlers include Zach Krause (28-8), Avery Varner (27-2), Daniel Cooper (26-12), Robert Mendoza (23-10), Werner (21-11), Gabe Walentowski (20-13) and Zach Tolles (18-10).

Just to display the strength of the Green Team, out of 25 teams at Northwood's Jim Derr Memorial Invitational, they placed fourth as a team with 159 points. Walentowski was first at 152, Cole Watson second at 126, Pendergraff third at 120, Werner fourth at 170, Latta fifth at 132 and Daniel Cooper sixth at 285.

They also placed fifth at St. John's Jesuit's Bill Urban Memorial Tournament, scoring 127 points. Varner and Latta won championships, Krause and Watson were runners-up. At the Fremont St. Joseph Invitational, the Green team placed second out of 12 teams with 168 points as Candio DeLuna (113) and Varner won championships.

Eagles thinking 'state bid'

The most important goal of the Eastwood bowling teams this year was to reach the state tournament.

For the boys team, that dream is still alive, however, for the girls it is not.

There are eight seniors on the boys and girls teams, and the boys team was 10-2 in dual meets and was the No. 1 seed at the sectional meet. The girls team was 11-1 and was the No. 3 seed.

At the 15-team Division II sectional at River City Bowl-A-Way in Napoleon the boys were runners-up behind Napoleon. The district was Saturday at Westgate Lanes in Lima. The boys team reached the state tournament two years ago, but lost to eventual state champion Coldwater in the quarterfinals. They came close to qualifying last year but no cigar.

"I think we'd all agree that last year when we didn't get out of districts that was kind of disappointing. I think since five of us on the team are seniors I think it would be really good to get out of districts and get down to state. We definitely have a good team," said senior team captain Josh Hahn, who has a 188 average.

Top bowler Noah Jankowski (203 average) adds, "Getting out of districts would be great because last year wasn't so hot and we didn't bowl as well as we should have. I feel like now we have the talent and we have the mindset to go through districts and to state, and that is something that would be really cool because it's our senior year, and the majority of us are seniors."

The rest of the boys team are seniors Jesse Lopez (194), Hunter Shiffler (201) and Sam Kahle (171), junior Josh Dennis (184) and freshman Austin Shiffler (161). Veteran coach Jay Young knows his team has to be on when the time comes.

"We hope so, but when it comes tournament time it's a one-day deal. Whatever happens that day, just like in softball or anything, if we don't have a pretty good game we will be out immediately. Our expectations are high. Both teams are pretty solid and we hope to achieve at least some of our goals," Young said.

The boys team has won two tournaments, the Sandusky Christmas Invitational and the Bucyrus Invitational and finished third at three others — the Huron Invitational, the Port Clinton Invite and the Toledo Classic.

At Eastwood, not all the bowlers participate year-round, so Young, who is also the bowling coach at Bowling Green State University, makes sure his bowlers stay focused once the season is on.

"We've got a lot of kids who play other sports and do other things, too. So, most of our kids, when it is in that season, they apply themselves and never stop applying. We go through technique a lot," Young said.

"You can't reinvent the wheel when

they've bowled that way for years. You tweak certain things and do certain things. It's like at the college level, I've got a kid coming in bowling for me in college we don't completely change what he is doing. We might tweak some things to make him better, but we can't reinvent his game. We'll take the good and try to make the negative a little better."

Young adds that he has never had eight seniors before, and he believes that at least two, maybe three, have a chance to bowl collegiately, possibly for him at BGSU.

For Hahn, he originally found bowling to be an intriguing sport, and then it became serious.

"I came into the program my sophomore year. I didn't really expect much of it. I was just looking for something to do and I ended up finding myself in a sport that is super-fun, and I think we all got real good. Our whole class came together and now we have a really solid team our senior year so I'm hoping we can take advantage of it," Hahn said.

Jankowski says no matter what happens at sectionals and districts, the bowlers on this team have each other's back.

"It's kind of funny because we're so diverse as individuals, but we congeal together as a team very well," Janowski said. "Like (Hunter) Shiffler, he has so many revs, and then you have other people who don't, but we all pick each other up as a team. We have people who may not be as good at picking up strikes, but are very good at picking up spares and vice versa, so we go back-to-back on that and we pick each other up as we go."

At the sectional meet, Eastwood was runner-up with 3,848 pins to finish behind Napoleon (3,887). Jankowski, whose score was third best out of 82 bowlers, bowled 256-188-205-649, Hahn bowled 224-155-175-554, Lopez 186-190-163-539, Shiffler 149-179-164-492 and Dennis bowled just two games — a 159 and 203, and adding up individual rounds, Eastwood bowled 2,742. In Baker rounds, Eastwood bowled 232-215-142-181-160-176-1,106.

The girls team won the Bucyrus tournament, finished second at Huron and the Toledo Classic and third at Sandusky. They had the same goal in mind, but that came to an end at sectionals — at least for the team.

The Eagles placed sixth, scoring 3,165 pins, behind Bryan (3655), Wauseon (3,593), Napoleon (3,587), Ottawa-Glandorf (3,355) but only the top four advanced to districts.

Team members are seniors Haley Davis (161), Kyla McCoy (152) and Carley Chandler (147), sophomores Ryleigh Bodnar (173) and Lyndsey Chandler (112) and freshmen Jacey Wonderely (137) and Sara Burrell (108).

Davis says her game wouldn't be where it is without the tutelage of coach Young.

"He's definitely helped improve it. He's helped a lot with my mechanics and not letting it get inside my head every time I throw a bad shot," Davis said.
