Harriers off to regionals
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Donnelly, O'Connor, Ewerson earn All-Press honors

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At the Ohio State University Gray Course, Dublin Jerome golfer Audrey Ryu shot a two-under par 71-67—138 to win a Division I state girls golf individual championship.

In second place was Aurora golfer Brooklyn Millard, who shot one-under par 71-68—139 to finish second. It is hard to compete against high school golfers who are shooting under par.

St. Ursula junior Payton Donnelly, a Curtice resident, was the only local golfer, boys or girls, to qualify for this year's state tournament, shooting 78-87—165 to finish in 44th place out of 72 golfers. Donnelly is the Alan Miller Jewelers All-Press Girls Golfer of the Year.

Donnelly shot an 41-40—81 at the district meet to lead St. Ursula to a district championship and a spot in the state tournament, where the Arrows shot 674 to finish ninth out of 12 teams. New Albany won the state title, shooting 588.

Donnelly, the Three Rivers Athletic Conference champion and golfer of the year, was joined by junior Hannah Chung (84-85—169), freshman Emma Myers (81-88—169), sophomore Sophie Antypas (79-93—172) and senior Lexie Murphy (95-92—187) in Columbus. The Arrows are coached by Jim McGowan.

As a freshman at the Division I state tournament, Donnelly was part of an Arrows' team that finished 10th out of 12 teams. Donnelly shot 91-88—179 to finish 62nd individually out of 72 golfers and her team shot 666.

Donnelly was hoping to make it to the state meet last year, but fell short, even though she upped her game. Donnelly was also named TRAC Golfer of the Year her sophomore year after shooting a 76 and her team shot a 331 to win a league tournament championship.

McGowan, who will only lose one golfer to graduation, believes next year could be even better. That is because of the work ethic Donnelly provides as a team leader.

"Her game has come around in every aspect. She works at it non-stop," McGowan said. "She is totally committed to the game. She's a 12-month a year golfer. She practices all the time."

From the mens' tees, you could say, there were no state qualifiers from the Eastern Maumee Bay community, but two cousins are making sure there game contin-

ues to improve.

Clay golfer Jason O'Connor and Northwood golfer Eli O'Connor are cousins and Northwood coach Reese Snyder says they play together during the summer.

Jason O'Connor, a senior, reached the Division I district tournament and he is joined by Genoa golfer Jake Ewerson, the Northern Buckeye Conference Golfer of the Year, as the boys All-Press Co-Golfers of the Year.

O'Connor, who averaged 84.5 strokes while earning All-Three Rivers Athletic Conference honors, shot 39-42—81 at Stone Ridge Golf Club in Bowling Green to qualify for the district tournament.

Jason made the most of his four years," Clay coach Rob Belegrin said. "We play in a tough league, and getting all-conference honors is not easy, but he fought through some injuries and made the most of his Clay golf experience."

In the TRAC, competing against some of the best prep golfers in the Toledo metro area, you almost have to shoot even par or better on a regular basis to compete. But the Eagles were able to hold their own

"We played well this year. There were really three groups of teams; the elite 280-315, then Clay 325-340, then really bad teams 350 and up. We were consistently in the middle, but still in a good spot," Belegrin said.

At the Division I sectional, Clay finished sixth out of 14 teams, scoring 337 points. Other Clay golfers were sophomore Vinny Gallaher (41-43—84), sophomore Brock Fussel (41-44—85), senior Aden Vriezelaar (40-47—87) and senior Spencer Fortier (47-43—90).

Genoa golfer Jake Ewerson, who averaged 40.8 strokes per nine holes in league play, had to dig down deep to finish strong, qualifying for Division III district play as an individual.

"Jake has had a nice season so far. He put together an impressive league run. In the four league shootouts, he finished second, fifth, 10th, and first," McPherson said.

"One thing that stands out the most about Jake is his drive. He has been internally motivated to get better at golf since he came out as a freshman and it obviously has shown in his successes this year. He is gritty, works hard, and shares his experiences with his teammates. He is a great student-athlete on and off the course."

Ewerson was fourth at sectionals, the Lakeland Invitational medalist, top five at

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Big Apple Deli victory boosts Rangers

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They might as well make a permanent showcase at Northwood High School for the Big Apple Deli Trophy.

Cardinal Stritch coach Gene Rucker noted that the last time Stritch beat Northwood, most of his players were not even born. But he thought this was the year to do it.

However, in the final regular season game, Northwood defeated Cardinal Stritch, 49-48, in a wild and crazy shootout and retained possession of the Big Apple Deli Trophy. The Rangers garnered 422 yards rushing and the Cardinals had 280 rushing and 116 passing.

Entering that game, the Rangers (4-4 overall, 3-1 Toledo Area Athletic Conference) and Cardinals (5-3, 2-2) still had a shot at a co-championship if Ottawa Hills could beat Edon, but the Bombers prevailed 52-28.

Still, the Rangers finished one game behind league champion Edon (9-1, 4-0), who the Rangers did not play this year because of Covid protocols.

"Edon looks like the best team here. Edon is pretty loaded and has a veteran wingback from last year and they have a transfer in from Edgerton who was an all-state player over at Edgerton," Northwood coach Ken James said.

However, the Rangers were not done playing football yet. The win over Stritch propelled them into the Division VI playoffs. Saturday, No. 15 seed Northwood traveled to take on No. 2 seed Ashland Crestview (10-0) with the winner advancing to the regional quarterfinals. Crestview is ranked fifth in the final Associated Press poll. Stritch was not done yet, traveling to take on Colonel Crawford (9-1) Saturday.

It's been a strange season for Northwood — only one other close game, a 5-2 loss on a rainy night in Ottawa Hills, full of strange anomalies, like the score indicates.

"They drove the ball down on us early and turned it over at the three-yard line. Then we gave up a safety. We had a bad snap and the ball ended up in the end zone," James said.

"It went back and forth but nobody could really do anything for a while. Then they got decent position and they have a heck of a field goal kicker (junior Emilio Duran). Then we drove it down and fumbled it on the one-foot line later at the beginning of the fourth quarter, and it would have given us the lead. Then we got the safety on them right after that, and that is the way it ended."

The Rangers had their chances to win it, even kick a field goal early in the game that would have ultimately tied the score.

"We had some chances to win last week and made some errors. We kicked a field goal early, but they called a time out right before we kicked it, and then they got an offsides penalty that put us inside the five," James said.

"Percentage-wise, we thought we'd take a shot at it (touchdown), went for it and didn't get it. Then we turned it over a couple times — once at their one-yard line, so there's just some stuff we got to do. If we were a little more consistent, we'd be a good football team."

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Injuries force Northwood backs into musical chairs

Northwood football coach Ken James already knew going into the season that his team was going to be young. Then, you add in multiple injuries, and you have real issues.

"We're pretty deep into the bullpen in terms of guys," 36th-year coach Ken James said. (A television media person) asked, 'Do you have some running backs hurt?' I said, 'Yeah, why?' He said, 'Well, I see in your stats you've got a few different guys who like to rush for 100 or 120 yards in a game and then they don't ever carry the ball again.' I said, 'Yeah, that would be us this year.'

The biggest failure this team has had is no one's fault. It is not staying healthy, so the Rangers relied on what depth they have.

"We have to. It's where we are," James said. "Necessity has been the mother of invention for us. We are typically able to plug in back-ups in spots and we are deep enough. We went into the year OK in that regard and in the summer, we had guys start to go down, so we've lost three running backs plus one lineman. And, we've had a fourth running back who has had quite a bit of time with some injuries."

Sixteen different backs have carried the ball for Northwood led by 5-7, 174-pound sophomore Zaegan Byington (383 yards), 5-8, 149-pound senior Braden Alore (350), 5-9 165-pound senior Mickey Asad (294), 6-0, 189-pound junior Logan Collins (118), 5-9, 170-pound junior Montonio Baker (101) and 5-5, 125-pound freshman Luke Szekeres (100).

In a 49-48 Toledo Area Athletic Conference comeback win over Cardinal Stritch, Alore had 176 yards rushing on 20 carries and Asad had 117 on 19 carries. Mason Smith, a 6-1, 163-pound junior quarterback has completed 17 of 36 passes for 244 yards, including nine to Byington for 122.

The rotation of running backs has been like a game of musical chairs.

"We had two upperclassmen who were going to start out at split end, and one was a bigger kid who can run pretty well. One was Logan Collins and the other was Braden Alore — they were going to play out there and rotate out there and also play some tight end for us," James said.

"When one of the running backs went down in the summer, we put Collins in at running back. He rushed for 118 yards against Woodmore (34-0 Northwood victory) in week one but hurt his shoulder in the first half of the Woodmore game, so that was a season-ending injury because he blew his shoulder out," James continued.

"Then we've moved one of our fullbacks, Montonio Baker, over to halfback, but he broke his leg in week five. He had rushed for 100 yards against Lake in week

two and then we had Covid for a couple weeks and we finally came back, and he busted his leg. Brandon Gomez (5-7, 145-pound junior) hurt his knee in the summer at 7-on-7, so we've gotten decimated by injuries — that is what it is."

As a result, Alore has played nearly every position on the team, including snapping the ball to Smith.

"The Alore kid started out, and he was going to be the wideout for us and he plays outside linebacker on defense, so with those three running backs playing in the secondary and linebacker for us, we had him playing at safety — just worked him there to be safe. Then we had to move him to inside linebacker because one of the fullbacks who got hurt was an inside linebacker, so he was working three different spots on defense.

"On offense, because we had three offensive linemen down for the Woodmore game, we moved him to tackle. Later on in the Gibsonburg (44-18 Gibsonburg victory) week, our center went down, so we moved him into center for a little bit. Then we got a couple linemen back healthy, so we moved him out to halfback because we had another halfback go down, so he's been playing halfback and fullback the last few weeks or so. He hasn't played quarterback yet, so that's about the only position he hasn't played."

Middle linebacker Jarel Dixon, a 5-8, 186-pound junior, leads the defense with 58 tackles, Smith has 42, 5-11, 206-pound freshman linebacker Codey Wheeler has 39, Alore has 35, 6-0, 215-pound junior defensive end Gage Reed has 33 and 6-2, 225-pound junior defensive end Sean Kovacs has 30. Dixon has two fumble recoveries and 5-11,

160-pound free safety Carson Gutekunst has two interceptions and knocked down three passes.

How has it all worked out? Well, the Rangers are in the playoffs, albeit an expanded playoff where 16 teams from each region qualify. A few years back Northwood finished undefeated and didn't qualify when eight teams got in.

"We've hung together quite well. Unfortunately, we are playing some freshmen, we are playing quite a few sophomores," James said. "We're playing some guys who are good football players but are not quite physically ready to be varsity guys from a speed and strength standpoint. They are playing hard, doing what we ask, and they are getting better every week, competing hard, but they need another year in the weight room essentially."

It was not what James expected, but he hopes it will pay off for his team next year.

"We should if everybody gets healed up properly from all their injuries, we should have starters back. We'll lose a handful of good seniors, but it's a small crew to begin with and we had some of those guys get hurt. But we'll have guys who started at least a game or two back at every spot on both sides of the ball," James said.

Comets up game, look to make a postseason push

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After losing two of its first three games, there might have been reason to be pessimistic about Genoa's chances of making the playoffs.

Instead, the Comets rebounded following early losses to Archbold and Huron, which were sandwiched around a victory over Oak Harbor, and Genoa qualified for the playoffs with a 5-5 record and a 4-3 mark in the Northern Buckeye Conference.

Genoa, which welcomed its new coach, David Mifsud into the fold this season, finished 10th in the Division V, Region 18 standings with 8.95 points. The Comets played Richwood North Union on Saturday and, if they win, will play the winner of Elyria Catholic and Marion Pleasant. It's a region loaded with solid teams like Otsego, Elmwood, Eastwood, Ottawa-Glandorf and Liberty-Benton, among others.

Dual-threat quarterback Aiden Brunkhorst leads the offense. The sophomore has completed 100-of-184 passes, a 54.3 percent completion rate, for 1,087 yards with 12 touchdowns and seven interceptions. He's carried the ball 90 times for 365 yards and two scores and has 1,452 all-purpose yards.

Brunkhorst leads a three-wide, two-back set with Gus Trainer as the top running back, who's rushed 80 times for 540 yards and five touchdowns. Justin Barlage (29 carries, 206 yards, 3 TD) and Robert Messenger (25 carries, 205 yards, 2 TD) have also contributed, running for a combined 511 yards and five touchdowns.

The three starting wide receivers are Mason Drummond, Merced Diaz and Tim Materni. Diaz has 18 catches for 287 yards and five touchdowns, Barlage has caught 23 passes for 268 yards and three scores, Messenger has 27 catches for 204 yards and Drummond has caught 14 passes for 158 yards.

Zach Bierbaum is the starting center with Ethan Crawford and Colten Stewart

flanking him at the guard positions. Andrew Szepliela and Caleb Gittus are the tackles and John Shinaver is the primary sub off the bench.

Aiden Hemmert is the kicker and punter.

"I would say (the offense) is the one area on the team where the slowest developing part of the process (has taken place). We do have a lot of young guys that start on offense, and part of (the challenge) is trying to find your identity as a team and find your strengths," said Mifsud.

"It's clear to me now that I would've liked to have gotten a few more touches for Robert and Justin. I feel like they are great contributors. We have pretty good balance, we're going to spread it around. I feel like we're still improving, and we're still finding ways to get it done."

Mifsud is pleased with the performance of his quarterback this season.

"Aiden is just a sophomore and people can look at him and like him or criticize him," said Mifsud. "He's thrown for over 1,000 yards and 12 touchdowns and he's rushed for 365 yards."

Defensively, Genoa employs the 3-4. Drew Posey is the nose guard with Szepliela and Donny Tucholski as the defensive ends. Stewart and Trainer are the strong-side linebackers and Barlage and Braylen Bryant man the weak side. Bierbaum rotates in with the linebackers. Jaycob Barlage and Drummond are the safeties and Messenger and Diaz are the cornerbacks. Materni sees time at defensive back, too.

Stewart leads the defense

Stewart, who has been a beast on defense, leads the team with 88 tackles, followed by Bryant (62), Drummond (56) and Trainer (55).

"We have a philosophy of an aggressive defense and we hope to force turnovers and get stops," Mifsud said. "For the defense, it's been a developmental process. Lucky for us, we've had this bend but don't

break mentality.”

The combined record of the teams that have defeated the Comets is 40-7 (.851), and all of them qualified for the playoffs.

The 28-0 win over Oak Harbor was very impressive, but Mifsud was especially pleased with the Lake victory.

In the 42-14 win over the Flyers, Genoa broke a 14-14 tie by scoring 28 unanswered points. Brunkhorst completed 10-of-14 passes for 75 yards and two touchdowns to go with 120 rushing yards and a score, Diaz caught two touchdown passes (20, 11), Messenger and Trainer had touchdown runs and Drummond had an 86-yard interception return for a touchdown. As a team, the Comets had 34 carries for 231 yards.

“I think the Lake game (stands out). I feel like we made plays on offense and defense in clutch situations, and we just put it all together and played with confidence and determination in that game,” said Mifsud. “I think if we could have played Huron in week six or week seven, (it might have been different). I feel like we’re a much better team now.”

Genoa followed up the win over Lake by losing 36-21 to Otsego, the Northern Buckeye Conference champion and third-ranked team in Division V, but the game

was tied at 14 at halftime, providing a silver lining for the Comets as they were able to go toe to toe with one of Ohio’s best teams.

The victory over the Rockets was especially important, not just because it was the Celestial Bowl, but because the Comets were coming off a 27-0 loss in the opener to Archbold, which is ranked No. 1 in D-VI.

Following the win over Oak Harbor, Genoa lost, 14-9 to Huron, but followed that up with a 14-9 win over Rossford.

“They moved the ball, they have a great offense, but we kept them out of the end zone; that’s what won the game,” said Mifsud. “We had a huge turnover that we caused to kind of ice the game. We feel really good about how our defense has played.”

Mifsud was encouraged by what he saw from the Genoa community when he took the job, and he loves the support the village and its surrounding area has shown his club.


“It’s really exciting to be a part of Genoa football and really in this Northwest Ohio atmosphere,” said Mifsud. “It’s exciting because there is great media coverage, Friday night results on TV and great high school coverage. There are some diehard Genoa fans that give us tremendous support and encouragement. They’re there rooting for us. It’s been a great way to start my experience here at Genoa.”

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2021 CITY OF OREGON LEAF COLLECTION RULES AND SCHEDULE

We ask residents to please follow these rules when raking leaves:

1. Do not place leaves in the street or curb and gutter area, ditches and drainage swales.

Leaves in the street interfere with storm drainage, causing blockages and flooding. The correct location for leaf piles is in the lawn area approximately 1-3 feet from the curb or road edge. Please note, due to local flood prevention and storm water quality regulations to improve Maumee Bay, placing leaves in a storm drain, curb and gutter, ditch, or drainage swale, is a direct violation of Oregon Municipal Code Sections 521.12 and 905.12 (See City website for specific code language at www.oregonohio.org)

2. Do not include animal waste, grass clippings or yard waste (sticks, branches, straw, pumpkins, etc.) with the leaves.

Leaf collection machines are designed to pick up leaves only. Other items will plug these machines causing downtime and delays in your scheduled pick-up dates.

3. Do not place the leaf piles near trees, mailboxes or signs.

Obstructions like these cause crews to stop and hand rake, thus slowing the collection process. Please keep the leaf pile a minimum of three (3) feet from the said obstructions.

Leaf Collection Schedule

Leaves will be collected in the areas listed below on a rotating basis—two (2) days in each area (approximately every two (2) weeks) as scheduled to complete the job or as long as weather permits (snowfall and ice). Please be advised that the schedule below may end early due to inclement weather or as warranted by existing conditions. **Leaves must be bagged for garbage pick-up when the schedule ends. Leaves may be bagged and put out with the weekly garbage pick-up at any time (40lb bag limit).** The City suggests that you use your leaves for compost and bedding for your garden areas. No parking on streets during leaf pick-up in your area on days scheduled.

Area #1 (From Navarre Avenue (both sides) to the south city limits and from Lallendorf Road to the west city limits)
Nov. 1 or 2 – Nov. 17 or 18

Area #2 (From the west side of Wheeling Street to the west city limits and from Navarre Avenue northerly to Seaman Road)
Nov. 3 or 4 – Nov. 22 or 23

Area #3 (From the east side of Wheeling Street to Lallendorf Rd. and north of Navarre Avenue to Starr Avenue)
Nov. 8 or 9 – Nov. 29 or Nov. 30

Area #4 (North of Starr Avenue to Corduroy Road (both sides) and from the east side of Wheeling Street to Coy Road (both sides)
Nov. 10 or 12 – Dec. 1 or 2

Area #5 (Bay Shore Road (both sides) north to Maumee Bay from Alabama Street east, including South Shore Park south of Bay Shore Road)
Nov. 15 or 16 – Dec. 6 or 7

Area #6 (All main roads and all other areas not included in areas 1 thru 5) will be collected on an “as needed” basis.



Thank you, residents, for not raking your leaves into our streets. Leaves in the street can get into the storm drains causing them to plug. The leaves also decay in the storm drains which causes decayed material to get into our local streams and ultimately Lake Erie. Any leaves remaining after the last scheduled pick-up must be bagged and set out for refuse collection.

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Ninth-ranked Eagle harriers continue their dominance

In the girls Division II district cross country race at Owens Community College's Findlay campus meet, Eastwood girls won the championship, scoring 39 points to defeat second place Liberty-Benton (64).

For Eastwood, ranked ninth in the state coaches' poll, sophomore Haley Sponaugle (19:37.15), freshman Leah Emch (20:02.84) and sophomore Avery Bowman (20:08.23) finished fifth through seventh. Eastwood junior Talia Baum (20:24.83) was ninth and sophomore Zoe Ramsey (20:58.92) was 12th.

Szyperski three-peats

Press carrier and long time area wrestling coach Joe Szyperski has won an unprecedented third straight Soothsayer championship.

He is the first Soothsayer in the 20-year history of prep gridiron soothsaying to three-peat.

Szyperski went 11-3 in his final week, one better than his Gladieux Home Center co-worker, Ron Gladieux, to break a tie and won by one game.

Szyperski finished at 103-28 (78.6 percent), followed by Gladieux (102-29), Press contributing sportswriter Yaneek Smith (94-37), Toledo Sports Network producer Mike Jameson (93-38), TSN broadcaster Mik Gonzales (89-42), Oregon businessman Alan Miller (88-43), Genoa Banking Company President Marty Sutter (87-44) and Bench's Greenhouse's Jill Bench (86-45).

Last year in a shortened six-week season, Szyperski defended his soothsayer championship, finishing 50-12 (80.6 percent) in choosing the winners of high school and professional football games.

He was under one percent behind the all-time record for correct picks. Two years ago in picking the winners of 148 high school, college, and professional football games, Ron Gladieux and Szyperski both finished 119-29, which at 80.4 percent was also slightly under the all-time record. 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
