## Zoning dispute Judge sets deadline for parties

Wood County Common Pleas Court Judge Matthew Reger has issued an order setting Sept. 4 as the deadline for Lake Township and the owner of Woodville Road Nursery to file motions for summary judgment in their legal dispute.

The judge's order notes the parties have agreed to forgo oral arguments in the case and set Oct. 2 and Oct. 9 as the deadlines for response and reply briefs. "No further extensions will be considered," the order says.

The township trustees, plaintiffs in the case, are seeking an injunction against James Mlynek, owner of the nursery, to prevent him from using parcels of property along Woodville Road, where he operates a transfer station to temporarily store leaves before composting them at his nursery.

The parties are at odds over the width of a required buffer mound at the western perimeter of the parcels along Bailey Road and whether or not the use of the parcels complies with the township's B-2 (general commercial) zoning regulations.

By a 2-1 vote, the trustees in May 2018 agreed to Mlynek's request to rezone the two parcels covering 2.3 acres from R-2 residential to B-2 commercial but included two stipulations: Mlynek would be required to construct an earthen mound at least 4 feet high with trees along the perimeter of the western side of the property that abuts Bailey Road residences and he would have to agree to not place an access road from Bailey to the parcels.

Mlynek contends he has met the buffer requirement, including planting of trees, but the township later added a requirement it had to be 25 feet wide.

## EPA Loans given for water quality improvements

Oregon, Toledo, and the Northwestern Water & Sewer District are among Northwest Ohio entities to receive \$82 million in financing in low interest rate funding from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency to improve wastewater and drinking water infrastructure and to make other water quality improvements.

The lower interest rates and principal forgiveness will save communities more than \$14.4 million.

Oregon is receiving a \$867,514 loan to fund the replacement of a waterline on Starr Avenue between Wynn and Stadium roads and to install a waterline on Norden Road from Cedar Point Road to Bayshore Road to create a looped system for a dead end on Bayshore Road.

Oregon Public Service Director Paul Roman said last week that the loan will cover the entire cost of both projects.

"The projects are almost completed," he said. "The total cost of the projects is \$896,000."

The city replaced the waterline on Starr Avenue between Wynn and Stadium roads with an eight inch waterline, he said.

The installation of a 12-inch waterline on Norden Road from Cedar Point Road to Bayshore Road will create a looped system for a dead end on Bayshore Road. The looped system will improve water pressure in the area, he said.

"The existing waterline on Bayshore Road has been at a dead end for a long time," he said. "When you go around the block with a waterline, you want the pipe to go around the block, you don't want it to dead end on the road. Right now, the main feed to Bayshore is by way of Stadium and Bayshore roads, west of Stadium. It provides water to that area - South Shore Park. But when it gets down to Bayshore Road,

it dead ends. So we are running a waterline through the state park of what was the old Norden Road right-of-way to add more pressure to the entire system. Looping is like putting two hoses together to provide more pressure to an area. So basically, we're adding more piping, and it adds more water pressure to the whole South Shore Park area."

Toledo is receiving a \$37.8 million loan to upgrade filters at the Collins Park drinking water treatment plant, installing sand and granular activated carbon media to provide additional treatment for harmful algal bloom contaminants.

The Northwestern Water & Sewer District is receiving three loans totaling \$3.1 million. One loan is to improve the sanitary sewer system in the district's Area 300 and Area 400 to eliminate sanitary sewer overflows and residential basement flooding. The other two loans will fund waterline replacements in Rossford and Lime City.

Ottawa and Wood counties are among the health departments, districts, or county commissioners to receive \$150,000 in principal forgiveness loans for the repair and replacement of household sewage systems.

The Metropolitan Park District of the

He also argues the township hasn't enforced buffer or mound requirements on a similarly-zoned composting facility at a nearby Mathews Road parcel.

The township complaint says Mlynek has "failed to establish either a 50 (foot) buffer yard or install an obscuring wall or landscape/mound on a 25-foot buffer yard that complies with the... provisions of the Lake Township Zoning Resolution."

"Defendant (Mlynek) has not and does not use said parcels for any of the ...permitted or conditional uses for B-2 General Commercial properties."

The township is represented by the Wood County prosecutor's office in the case.

A pre-trial hearing in a related case between Mlynek and the township to decide alleged zoning infractions is set for Aug. 25 in Perrysburg Municipal Court.

## Census follow-up

Census takers in Ohio are beginning to follow up with households that have not yet responded to the 2020 Census.

The current self-response rate in Ohio is 67.6%, including 52.2% who have responded online. The Census Bureau will need to visit the remaining addresses to collect responses in person.

Households can still respond by completing and mailing back the paper questionnaire they received, by responding online at [2020census.gov](http://2020census.gov), or by phone at 844-330-2020.

Those who respond will not need to be

visited to obtain their census response.

Census takers will wear masks follow CDC and local public health guidelines when they visit. Census takers are hired from local communities. All speak English, and many are bilingual. If a census taker does not speak the householder's language, the household may request a return visit from a census taker who does. Census takers will also have materials on hand to help identify the household's language.

If no one is home when the census taker visits, he or she will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online, by phone or by mail.

People are encouraged to cooperate with census takers and ensure that everyone who was living in their household as of April 1, 2020, is counted.

### How to identify census takers

Census takers can be easily identified by a valid government ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date on the badge. To confirm a census taker's identity, contact the Philadelphia regional census center at 267-780-2600 to speak with a Census Bureau representative.

## Stone Lab has its own backyard neighbor

When Stone Lab's Dr. Kristin Stanford walked into first-grader Sophia Schroeder's classroom nearly 15 years ago, Schroeder remembers being mesmerized.

"Stone Lab had always been a part of our community, our backyard neighbor teaching us about the environment," said Schroeder. "But it was at that moment I saw why the island I lived on was such a unique place and that I could do my part to protect it."

Holding a Lake Erie Watersnake, Stanford talked to Schroeder's Put-in-Bay Elementary class about why the native snake was important to the Lake Erie ecosystem and what steps she and her fellow South Bass Island residents could take to help the federally-threatened species.

As Schroeder grew, so did her Stone Lab encounters, with an overnight field trip to the lab in fifth grade where she pulled up water samples from the lab's research vessel Gibraltar III and a high-school limnology class focusing on Lake Erie water.

But it was a science fair project she developed her senior year that truly got her hooked on her future career in water research and brought her back to Stone Lab.

"I was really curious about how plastic microfibers — those fibers that wash out of your clothes — affect microorganisms in freshwater," explained Schroeder. "I found research for saltwater but nothing on how microfibers would affect organisms in freshwater so I did my science project on it."

That novel research concept caught the attention of Stone Lab researcher (and science fair judge) Dr. Justin Chaffin and over the course of two summers, Schroeder worked with Chaffin as a volunteer researcher to expand her microfiber research at the program's water quality lab.

When the time came to decide on her future university and major, Schroeder knew biochemistry — a mixture of her two Lake Erie passions of biology and chemistry — was her major and the place to do it was the research epicenter she already knew, Stone Lab's parent, The Ohio State University.

But Schroeder's backyard neighbor came knocking on her door again with the opportunity to take on one of Stone Lab's competitive Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) water quality projects where she could study the effects of light and nutrients on benthic algae in Lake Erie.

Now finishing up her third year at Ohio State, Schroeder is starting to apply for internships and already feels prepared. "I am so grateful to Stone Lab because what

these natural resource agencies want from their applicants is experience — experience in using water quality equipment in the field, logging in data and assessing that data — all the tools I got from my time at

Stone Lab."

## EPA gives loans

Toledo Area is also receiving a low interest loan from the Ohio EPA. A \$2.9 million loan will help acquire and restore a 185-acre golf course that is adjacent to the 610-acre Secor Metropark. The golf course will be restored to native plant communities to re-establish more than 160 acres of high quality wetlands and enhance the natural functions of four acres of existing wetlands and Prairie Ditch. More than 7,000 feet of ditches will be removed to improve hydrology, according to the Ohio EPA.

Statewide, Ohio EPA awarded more than \$466 million in loans during the first half of 2020, including \$25.5 million in principal forgiveness. Combined, Ohio communities will save more than \$90.9 million when compared to market-rate loans.

The projects are improving Ohio's surface water quality and the reliability and quality of Ohio drinking water systems. The loans include funds to 20 communities to help low-income property owners repair or replace failing household sewage treatment systems. These loans do not have to be repaid, according to the Ohio EPA.

Created in 1989, the Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) helps communities improve their wastewater treatment systems. The Water Supply Revolving Loan Account (WSRLA), started in 1998, provides loans for improvements to community drinking water systems and nonprofit, non-community public water systems. Both programs offer below-market interest rate loans, which can save communities a substantial amount of money compared to market-rate loans, according to the Ohio EPA.

# University of Toledo asking, 'How much is too much?'

People living around Lake Erie are quite familiar with algal toxins – harmful algal blooms are a near-yearly occurrence, and those blooms can produce toxins that need to be removed from drinking water drawn from the lake. Researchers at The University of Toledo are now setting their sights on another potential set of contaminants.

Dr. Steven Haller and Dr. David Kennedy have received funding from Ohio Sea Grant for a two-year project ending in early 2022. The researchers are focusing on the effects of the chemicals found in pharmaceuticals, personal care products and industrial materials on people with pre-existing liver and kidney conditions. By using liver and kidney cells from human donors, they hope to closely approximate the effects of these chemicals on human tissues, more so than they could with animal models.

"There's been a little bit of work done in terms of these chemicals' effects on health, but our goal for this project is not just to understand how healthy people process these chemicals," Kennedy said. "We also want to see if vulnerable or at-risk patients might be at greater risk because of the chronic conditions they already have."

Haller explained that they are trying to establish both the "no observable adverse effect level – the point where you don't see any adverse effects" and the "lowest observed adverse effect level, which is the lowest dose where you actually see a biologically significant effect on these cells."

The research also helps train undergraduate, graduate, and medical students from a number of University of Toledo departments.

The researchers suspect that in people with existing liver or kidney conditions, that lowest observed adverse effect level

is lower than in healthy people, which would have implications for public health recommendations and regulations centered around managing emerging chemicals in the environment.

The team is using human cells from procedures such as routine biopsies, with consent from the donors. Once the cells are cultured in the laboratory, they can be exposed to the chemicals that were selected for the study, and the damage those chemicals do to the cells can be assessed. Results from these cell culture studies will help inform efforts to prevent, diagnose, or treat the cellular injury associated with these exposures.

"If we determine that a particular disease is making people more susceptible, we give that information to partners like the Toledo-Lucas County Health Department and the Ohio Department of Health so that they can provide guidelines for prevention," Kennedy said. "Guidelines such as 'if you have diabetes, you may be at


more risk from these kinds of exposures, therefore you may need to limit your exposure through these means."

The researchers are also thinking about the diagnostic tools medical staff use to determine if people have been affected by certain chemicals, because they learned during a study on algal toxins that the damage those toxins cause in the liver doesn't show up on standard bloodwork for liver damage. So in addition to evaluating those standard tests for the emerging chemicals they're interested in, they will also look for enzymes and proteins in the cell samples that do indicate that damage and could be added to a panel of laboratory tests.

"And then the third part is therapeutics," Kennedy said. "Some things are good at telling you if damage is occurring, but then some things are more fundamental to the cellular processes that are being damaged. So if that's happening here, we can look at ways of treating or reversing that damage."

# FirstEnergy says report will be late

FirstEnergy Corp. has notified the Securities and Exchange Commission it will be late filing its 10-Q financial report for the second quarter due to the federal investigation into Larry Householder, the former speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives, and House Bill 6, which benefited a former subsidiary of FirstEnergy.

In its notification of late filing to the SEC, the company states it received subpoenas for records on July 21 from the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Ohio – the same day a complaint and affidavit listing federal criminal allegations against Householder and four associates were unsealed.

"The company was not aware of the criminal investigations, affidavit or subpoenas before July 21," the notification says. "The company is cooperating fully in the investigation."

In addition to the subpoenas, some company stockholders and customers in late July filed several lawsuits against the company and "certain current and former directors, officers and other employees" relating to the allegations against Householder and those allegedly affiliated with him.

"In connection with the investigation, subpoenas and subsequent pending and threatened litigation, the company requires additional time to complete its quarterly review and closing procedures and to provide appropriate disclosure in the Form 10-Q," the notification says.

A 10-Q report includes condensed financial statements, management discussion and analysis of the company's financial condition, as well as legal proceedings and the use of proceeds from the sale of equity securities.

Companies are required to file their 10-Qs within 40-45 days after the end of their

quarters depending on the size of their public float, which is the portion of shares held by the public and not by company officers.

According to the criminal complaint filed by the district attorney's office, from March 2017 to March 2020, millions of dollars were paid in exchange for the assistance of then speaker of the House of Representatives, Larry Householder, and four associates, in passing House Bill 6 and then working to defeat a ballot initiative that, if passed by voters, would have rescinded the legislation.

In all, about \$60 million was funneled through Generation Now, an entity formed as a 501(c)(4) organization, from an "energy company and its affiliates during the relevant period," the complaint says.

House Bill 6, passed by the state legislature last summer and signed by Gov. Mike DeWine, created the state's Clean Energy Program but provides subsidies for coal and nuclear plants.

FirstEnergy Solutions, a former subsidiary of FirstEnergy Corp., emerged from bankruptcy as a separate entity early this year with a new name, Harbor Energy. FES filed for bankruptcy protection in federal court in 2018, arguing its coal and nuclear plants could not compete against cheaper energy sources such as natural gas.

Utility executives turned to the legislature for financial assistance and in April 2019 House Bill 6 was introduced, passing with bi-partisan support three months later. Without a ratepayer subsidy, the FES-operated Davis-Besse Nuclear Power Station and Perry Nuclear Power Station would be closed, FES management said.

In a July 27 statement, Charles Jones, CEO of FirstEnergy Corp., said the parent company and FES began discussing a separation in November 2016.

"At that point, I and other members of FirstEnergy leadership no longer had any decision-making power regarding the strategic direction of FES," he said.

## Sewer, water lines extended to NSG plant

The Wood County commissioners on Wednesday presented a \$250,000 check to Mark Sheffer, chairman of the Northwestern Water and Sewer District.

The money represents Wood County's commitment for a project to extend water and sewer lines to the NSG/Pilkington float-glass plant, currently under construction on Pemberville Road in Troy Township.

The total project consisted of 7,400 lineal feet of 12-inch waterline and 10,200 lineal feet of sanitary sewer line, with a total project cost of \$2.43 million.

NSG Group, a manufacturer of sheet glass and owner-operator of a glass plant in Rossford, announced in 2018 that it will spend \$265 million to construct a 511,000-square-foot glass plant in the township.

The plant will make specialty sheet glass for the solar panel manufacturing industry and its primary customer will

be First Solar Inc. The plant will employ about 110 hourly and 40 salaried employees with production expected to start in fall 2020.

The new plant is expected to produce about 130,000 tons of glass annually.

## Ickes sworn in as judge

Attorney Jon M. Ickes was sworn in recently to fill an open judge's seat of the Sandusky County Common Pleas Court Judge. The swearing in was done by Sandusky County Juvenile Court Judge, Bradley J. Smith.

Judge Ickes, of Fremont, must run for election on Nov. 3 to retain the seat for the term ending Dec. 31, 2020. Ickes is replacing Judge John P. Dewey, who retired on May 31.

## Penta board approves plan to restart school

During the Aug. 5 Penta Career Center Board of Education meeting, the board approved the Restart Plan for the 2020-2021 school year, which will be an alternating-day format, reducing the building capacity by 50 percent and only having students on campus four days a week.

The Penta Board also modified the school calendar pushing the start date from Aug 17 and 18 to Aug. 20 and 21.

The Penta Restart Plan will have all students from Wood County schools (Bowling Green, Eastwood, Elmwood, Lake, North Baltimore, Northwood, Otsego, Perrysburg, and Rossford) on campus on Tuesdays and Thursdays each week, with the first day of school set for Thursday, Aug. 20.

Students from all the other member schools (Anthony Wayne, Benton-Carroll-Salem, Genoa, Maumee, Springfield, Swanton, and Woodmore) will attend school on Wednesdays and Fridays, with a start date of Friday, Aug. 21.

The other three days of school will be remote learning. All instructional staff are required to report to campus five days a week.

"We feel this is the best plan for Penta given the current environment," said Edward Ewers, superintendent. "This schedule allows us to deliver on our promise to provide a high-quality career-technical education by having students actively engaged in their career and academic classes."

This year, Penta has also adopted a new four-day model to which the school hopes to eventually transition when the community health issues subside. When Penta is able to begin its four-day model, students will attend school Tuesday-Friday with Mondays devoted to work-based learning experiences such as internships, paid work experiences, simulated work experiences or community service activities.

## Cocaine seized

Ohio State Highway Patrol troopers filed felony drug charges against a Wisconsin man after a traffic stop in Wood County. Troopers seized more than four pounds of cocaine worth approximately \$90,000.

On Aug. 10, at 6:52 p.m., troopers stopped a 2017 Nissan Altima with Mississippi registration for following too close and speed violations on the Ohio Turnpike.

A check of the vehicle identification number revealed it was entered as stolen. A probable cause search revealed the contraband.

The driver, Angel Padilla Torres, 44, Milwaukee, was incarcerated in the Wood County Justice Center and charged with possession and trafficking in cocaine, both first-degree felonies and receiving stolen property, a fourth-degree felony.

If convicted, he could face up to 23 years in prison and up to a \$45,000 fine.

Toledo police have arrested one man in connection with a murder in East Toledo and have issued a warrant for another suspect.

Anthony Perry, 20, was arrested Aug. 9 for his role in the shooting death of Robert Pedelrose, 72, and a warrant was issued for Robert McKay, 21.

Officers were dispatched Aug. 8 to 1204 Navarre Ave. on a report of a person being shot and found Pedelrose suffering from a gunshot wound. He was transported to St. Vincent's Medical Center where he later died.

# Millbury in final phase of reducing backups

The Village of Millbury has nearly completed a long-term, multi-phased project that will reduce flooding following heavy rain events.

Jerry Greiner, president of the district, said last week that the village is in the final phase of a project to reduce inflow and infiltration (I&I).

"We're wrapping up some different areas in Millbury. We're hoping to remove the last of the storm water that we've been trying to remove from the system for the last 20 years," said Greiner.

The work includes, but is not limited to, eliminating connections from downspouts and sump pumps, he said.

"We're about done. There's been a fair amount of replacement of old sanitary lines that were either failing, cracked, broken or collapsed. That is all part of the last phase. We can say we've eliminated a fair amount of storm water and at least getting it out of the sanitary system," he said.

When ground water and storm water enter city collection systems – known as I&I – treatment plants become less efficient and systems become strained.

"Millbury's sewer flow follows a fairly long route before it gets treated," he said. "It gets pumped ultimately to the Oregon wastewater treatment plant. The more we can remove that storm water out of the sanitary system, the better it is for us. We're not pumping it any more than we need to. And that's less going to Oregon. Anything

we can do to reduce their capacity is good for everybody.”

### Controlled

Tom Stalter, the engineer for the district, said the long term project covers all of Millbury.

"We put a list together of all the problems, then just did one piece at a time," he said. "The last thing we did was the private service laterals – which goes from the sewer to the home. That made a significant impact. When we got a lot of rainfall, it used to fill up our sanitary sewers. We still get some, but not nearly as bad. It's controlled."

He said a lot of money over the years has gone into reducing I & I in the village. The cost, though, has been well worth it. It's made a big difference in avoiding flooded basements.

"We spent millions in Millbury in the

last six or seven years. When there was wet weather, and the sanitary sewers backed up, sometimes we would have to pump into the creek to avoid flooding basements. So we've done a lot of work rebuilding sewers and sewer laterals to the homes. We seem to have, if not corrected it, at least made it a lot better. It's made a huge difference. We have not pumped into the creek during wet weather in at least a year. So we're in pretty good shape now. We think we have a pretty good handle on it. If we do have issues in the future, hopefully they will be minor and we can take care of them."

### EPA funding

Most of the funding for the multi-phased project was from the Ohio EPA's Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF), he added. Created in 1989, the WPCLF helps communities improve their wastewater treatment systems. The program offers below-market interest rate loans, which can save communities a substantial amount of money compared to market-rate loans, according to the Ohio EPA.

"Many times, we'll nominate projects before they're quite ready," he said. "Sometimes the EPA can give us really favorable terms. If we can get the funds on better terms, we'll proceed with the project. We don't really plan on doing half of the projects on the list for the next year. It is fairly easy to apply for funding. The EPA does a nice job helping us out. Eventually, the projects will get done through that program, but we do nominate them a couple of years ahead of time."



# Arrest not a reflection on police department, Elmore's mayor says

The Village of Elmore administration has been fully cooperating with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and other agencies in the arrest of a village police officer for distributing child pornography, Mayor Rick Claar said.

Samuel Kurp, 26, who also resides in the village, was taken into custody Aug. 11 by the Toledo office of the FBI's Child Exploitation and Human Trafficking Task Force without incident.

"This is not a reflection on our police force at all," the mayor said. "We have a great bunch of guys. Jeff and the others got to work on filling the void in the department schedule so we will have minimal overtime."

Kurp worked full-time for the village and was hired from the Genoa Police Department, he said.

"He (Kurp) had been fully vetted by the Genoa department and again when we hired him. You just don't know what

one had been using a social media messenger app to upload and send 26 videos or image files of child sexual abuse material.

Investigators determined the IP addresses used in the transmission of the material were utilized by Kurp, who had lived in Oregon.

Search warrants were executed Aug. 11 at Kurp's address in Oregon and his residence in Elmore.

The Elmore Police Department confirmed Kurp's work schedule on certain dates that coincided with when the pornographic images were distributed.

Kurp was scheduled to have an initial

appearance in federal court on Aug. 12 but waived his right to the hearing.

"It's been total cooperation with the FBI," Mayor Claar said.

He said Police Chief Jeffrey Harrison met with other officers of the department to bolster their morale and not let the arrest affect their work.

A post on the Elmore department's Facebook page states Kurp resigned his position with the department prior to being taken into custody by the FBI.

"At this time, we have no information that any local victims were involved," the post says.





# Why doesn't America have presidential debates?

On August 6, the Commission on Presidential Debates denied president Donald Trump's request to increase the number of debates between himself and Democratic nominee Joe Biden from three to four. Trump's case: The expansion of voting by mail means that many ballots will have been cast before the first scheduled fake debate on Sept. 29.

The CPD's response: "[T]he debate schedule has been and will be highly publicized. Any voter who wishes to watch one or more debates before voting will be well aware of that opportunity."

In reality, the number of CPD presidential debates will, as usual, come to a grand total of zero. The purpose of CPD since its formation in 1987 has been to, as Nancy M. Neuman, president of the League of Women Voters, noted at the time, "steal the debates from the American voters."

The events put on by CPD are not "debates." Debates involve formal arguments over questions of substance. CPD events are theatrical productions -- side-by-side candidate commercials, financed by millions of dollars in arguably illegal campaign contributions from corporate sponsors.

You almost certainly won't see the Constitution Party's Don Blankenship, Green Party nominee Howie Hawkins, or Libertarian presidential candidate Jo Jorgensen on the CPD "debate" stage this year. These two-contestant, two-winner beauty pageants are run by the two "major" parties, and since 1992 (when independent candidate Ross Perot got onto the stage and took 19 percent of the vote) have been specifically designed to exclude third party and independent candidates.

Going into the CPD "debates," Donald Trump's goal will be to make Joe Biden look senile, and Joe Biden's goal will be to make Donald Trump look stupid. They'll both almost certainly succeed.

When the events end, most viewers probably won't know any more than they did before about where those two candi-

dates stand on the important issues. For the candidates, the CPD, and the "major" parties, that's a feature, not a bug. If voters understood how similar the two "major" parties and their candidates are on actual policy, they might start taking a harder look at those third party and independent candidates.

Every four years, those other candidates spend a good deal of time and money trying to get over the CPD's bar, a bar they know will be manipulated or simply raised if that starts to look like a possibility.

We won't get real debates until voters start boycotting the parties and candidates who refuse to have them.

### Humane Society's garage sale canceled

After careful consultation among organizers, volunteers, and board members, Wood County Humane Society has decided to cancel its annual garage sale for 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Originally planned for May, the event was tentatively rescheduled for fall when the pandemic hit.

In an email to Shelter Manager Erin Moore, dated July 15, co-organizers Stephanie Ringler and Joseph Schroeder cited concerns over the health and safety of both volunteers and patrons as their rationale for cancelling the event.

"It is with great heaviness in our hearts that we have come to the conclusion that we will not be able to run a successful garage sale that would be socially distanced," the co-organizers wrote.

Held every May since 1993, the WCHS garage sale has been the largest annual fundraiser for the organization for nearly a decade. In 2019, the sale raised \$19,407.40, exceeding 2018 sales by \$2,277.75.

Located in Bowling Green, the Wood County Humane Society is a private, non-profit, managed admission shelter providing care for homeless, abused, or/and neglected pets.

The organization receives no funding from national humane organizations for daily operations, instead relying on earned revenue and the generosity of individual donors and businesses to fund programs such as Humane Investigations, Safe Pets, food assistance programs, low-cost spay/neuter opportunities and educational presentations.

“Our utmost importance is ensuring the health and safety of our children attending the program, our instructors and our families in the community,” said Community Education Coordinator Holly Hoffman.

Safety measures will be in place and strictly followed. All regulations for Titan Kids Club will follow Terra State regulations. Everyone will be required to wear a facial covering as long as they are medically able; temperatures will be taken at the entrance; classrooms will be sanitized and sanitization stations will be available for use. These regulations are subject to change based on current conditions at the time.

Each Titan Kids Club class is \$35 per child. Those interested in taking multiple classes, may become members by purchasing a membership for \$25. Members will receive a free Titan Kids Club T-shirt, a 10% discount on all classes, and access to the private Titan Kids Club Facebook group for additional activities. A family discount is available for parents/guardians enrolling multiple family members.

In addition to Titan Kids Club, Hoffman and her team are planning to implement “Titan Teens,” which will be a program for ninth through 12-grade students. Titan Teens will have classes in leadership, college and career readiness, fitness and more. # A first glimpse of Glass City Metropark

Members of the media got guided hard-hat tours Thursday at Glass City Metropark, now under construction on the east side of the Toledo riverfront.

“Interest in the first phase of park development, and plans for Glass City Riverwalk, has been tremendous,” said Dave Zenk, executive director of Metroparks Toledo. “We want to give people the opportunity to see what’s happening at the construction site and learn more about the rare opportunity we have to turn our riverfront into a world class destination.”

Phase 1 of Glass City, which will be completed this fall, will include:

- A 3,500-square-foot pavilion with restrooms, a concession window and green roof. The building will accommodate 150 people.

- Rooftop plaza space
- An event lawn that will accommodates 5,000 people for special events
- A sledding hill
- Aggregate and asphalt walking paths
- Water access for fishing, canoeing/kayaking
- Shoreline restoration
- Reforestation with more than 2,000 trees as well as prairie plants
- Stormwater wetlands and bioswales
- A boardwalk over water with seating
- The realignment of Riverside Drive
- A 70-vehicle parking lot
- A new curb cut for park access from E. Broadway Street

A separate contract is expected to be awarded late this year for construction of a bike and pedestrian bridge over Main Street to connect Glass City with International Park. The bridge will be build next spring. “The construction of the Glass City

Metropark is an important step to the revitalization of the riverfront and the East Toledo Community,” said District 3 Councilwoman Theresa Gadus. “Four years ago, I was one of many people that gathered for community input. There were so many great, diverse ideas and desires the community wanted to see. The Metropark had a large order to fill and I was pleasantly blown away that their plan incorporated everything our community desired and more.

“As Phase one is closer to completion, I believe that this will be a catalyst for carrying this energy of revitalization throughout the rest of East Toledo. The Metroparks have been an amazing partner and I do believe this will be a destination for not only East Toledoans, but for all of Northwest Ohio and Southeast Michigan.”

# United Way preparing students for school year

United Way of Greater Toledo (UWGT) has quickly changed its back-to-school season logistics, now distributing thousands of classroom supply kits, and leveraging corporate dollars to purchase Google Chromebooks, software and hotspots for at-home learning.

"United Way has completely shifted its operations because of COVID-19. Not only have we rerouted our day-to-day work; we are striving to safely execute and rescale our largest community events, without losing their impact," said Wendy Pestrue, president and CEO of UWGT.

The COVID-19 pandemic has led the nonprofit to cancel its annual "Kickoff to Caring," which gathers more than 1,000 volunteers to pack 5,000 backpacks full of supplies for students in need across Lucas, Wood and Ottawa counties.

"Unfortunately, we cannot host a large event like 'Kickoff to Caring' this year," Pestrue said. "That being said, the needs of students are still very real, so we must respond. Thanks to Dana Incorporated and Lucas County Job & Family Services, we are able to do just that."

After consulting with several community-based organizations and local school districts, UWGT has already packed, and will distribute, 4,000 school supply kits to Toledo Public Schools (TPS), Salvation Army, the Area Office on Aging's Kinship Navigator Program, Lucas County Foster Care and Sylvania Area Family Services. With learning predominately taking place in an online environment this year, there was an expressed need for at-home classroom materials such as pencils, pens, glue sticks, notebooks and markers.

"Whether kids are physically in the classroom or learning virtually, they need

supplies. With school operations being logistically fluid, we wanted to ensure that, whatever opportunity we helped make possible, the academic needs of students took center stage," Pestrue said.

UWGT's Wood County office will still distribute 336 backpacks full of supplies to their Salvation Army office for curbside pickup. County residents may dial 2-1-1 to reserve a bag.

UWGT's Ottawa County office plans to distribute 312 backpacks full of supplies to their Salvation Army office as well. Parents can pick up an application for a bag at The Sutton Center, 1854 E. Perry St., Port Clinton. (Must be an Ottawa County resident to qualify.)

In addition to these items, in early June, UWGT's Digital Strategy Committee leveraged a \$25,000 gift from the Accenture Detroit office. The dollars specifically went to TPS for the purchase of Google Chromebooks and internet hotspots. Through this partnership, TPS gained "experience software," improving digital communications between educators and students.

The Digital Strategy Committee was formed in 2018 and is comprised of chief information officers, data scientists and information technology professionals from the corporate, healthcare and academic sectors, who help guide UWGT's data collection strategies and best practices.

"When using words like 'predictive modeling' or 'data collection,' I get a lot of curious looks. If we, as a nonprofit, seek to tackle the root of community issues, we have to know where services are most needed, who is engaging in these services and, most importantly, asking if individuals find those services helpful," Pestrue said.

# Rangers seeking that elusive league title

After Northwood volleyball finished 13-10 overall and 4-4 in the Toledo Area Athletic Conference in his first season, second-year coach Josh Jordan believes that this year his team can win a championship.

Jordan, who was the junior varsity coach two years before taking the helm of the varsity, notes that last year the Rangers defeated rival and league perennial power Cardinal Stritch “not once but twice for the first time in recent history.”

“I think with our combined age and experience on the court this season I expect us to be at the top of the TAAC battling with the best programs,” Jordan said. “A culture change from last season is hopefully the key to lighting a fire under these athletes to get the wins they deserve in 2020.”

“For the 2020 season I believe some of our best strengths will be our ability to not give up on any play and fighting until the last point every set and every match. We plan on having a much more aggressive offense as well, so we are hoping to keep a lot of opponents off their game.”

The Rangers have eight returning letter winners, including 5-foot-8 senior outside hitter Ashlyn Rable, 5-6 junior outside hitter Alayna Avalos and 5-6 junior setter Ellee Weiss.

Rable was second team All-TAAC a year ago, getting 160 kills, 245 digs, 50 aces and a .410 hitting percentage. Avalos had 158 kills, 10 blocks and 30 aces and Weiss had 260 assists, 68 aces and 100 digs. Jordan says Rable and Avalos could be the two top hitters in the TAAC this season.

“I expect my outside hitters to run the show this year,” Jordan said. “We’re dueling Ashlyn Rable and Alayna Avalos on the outside hitter position. With a senior and junior running the front line I expect a ton of power mixed in with great touch and control of ball.”

“Alayna Avalos was a strong player for us last season. However, for the 2020 season I fully expect her to have a breakout season. Learning some control and better technique we will cut down the errors, increase the hitting percentage and up the number of kills exponentially.”

“Ellee Weiss is expected to be my top setter for the 2020 season. She is already a two-year letter winner gaining experience and matching it with incredible ball control and tempo. She will be the Northwood quarterback on the court this season making the offense successful.”

Jordan says Rable and 5-3 junior libero Hailey Apthorpe will lead the defensive side of the ball.

“This is her (Apthorpe’s) third season as a varsity contributing member and she is beginning to find her true form as libero for the team. Her ability to read the offense and a strong serve receive will give her the advantage this season,” Jordan said. “I also expect Ashlyn Rable to be a six-rotation player this season for us again, playing a strong back row role as an outside hitter.”

Jordan gives his athletes so much credit, that he believes several could continue playing collegiately if they put an effort toward it.

“I am slightly biased, but I believe I have a number of athletes who deserve looks from colleges due to their level of play. I expect this to continue this sea-

son. Ashlyn Rable, Alayna Avalos and Hailey Apthorpe all could be on the radar for the future,” Jordan said.

Among the returning letter winners, there are others who will contribute and may have a bright future, says Jordan.

“Erin Bouk (5-8 junior middle/right side) is another athlete I expect to turn the corner for us this season. She will continue to improve as we move her around from middle to right side depending on the lineup,” Jordan said.

“Tristan Sorosiak (5-10 sophomore middle) is one we have playing JV and swinging up to play a few sets of varsity every match. If she breaks out of her shell and works with us hard on getting the technique and footwork down, to match with her height and power she could eventually wind up a great weapon for us.”

Others contributing include 5-2 junior defensive specialist Mia Austin, 5-10 senior middle hitter Faren Bones, 5-8 sophomore right/outside hitter Aubrey Perlaky, 5-6 junior middle/right hitter Alexis Hutchinson, 5-3 sophomore defensive specialist Jade Wiley and 5-6 sophomore setter Mara O’Connor.

Jordan, who is assisted for the second year by Kenzie Egbert, admits the TAAC

has plenty of talent all the way around the league.

“I think the competition in the TAAC is the strongest we have seen in a long time. With our program being added to the mix and increasingly competitive, Toledo Christian only graduating one senior last year and a ton of talent, Ottawa Hills first-year head coach (Jack Kauffman) also has a bunch of great talent, Cardinal Stritch is always a competitive team in the TAAC due to talent and coaching and an Emmanuel Christian team that continues to improve. The TAAC will be a fun league to watch for volleyball in 2020.”

Jordan says his Rangers will have to overcome some of their own tendencies to keep in the race.

“We are a team that needs to understand our own abilities in order to be successful,” Jordan said. “In the past if we had a rough couple points it would take some time to get out of our heads. My hope is this does not continue for the 2020 season.”

“We are just excited and hopeful to have a 2020 season where these incredible young athletes can go prove their talents on the stage we offer them. As their coach I am excited to see this program continue to grow and gain traction in the TAAC.”



## OHSAA adjusts season if governor approves football

Following a recommendation from Governor Mike DeWine’s office to shorten the season due to concerns that COVID-19 may spike in early winter, the Ohio High School Athletic Association announced that if high school football games are approved by the governor, all teams will enter the playoffs beginning October 9 and the state championship games will be played no later than November 21.

The OHSAA Board of Directors, which assisted OHSAA staff to create the proposal and approved it by a 9-0 vote, considers this a win-win situation for all schools since it will not matter how many games each team has played leading up to the playoffs. Instead of the computer ratings system determining which teams qualify for the playoffs, the coaches in each region will conduct a tournament seed meeting the week of September 28 to form the regional bracket, similar to the process in other OHSAA team sports.

Schools may keep their first six previously scheduled games, but all regular-season football contracts are now voidable by either school, especially in the event that conferences redo their league schedules to fit into the first six weeks. In addition, the OHSAA will determine new playoff regions in September. Schools that are eliminated from the playoffs may continue to schedule regular-season games up until November 14.

Schools that have currently paused sports could still begin their season in September or early October and compete in the playoffs. Schools are not required to enter the playoffs if they would rather play regular-season games up until November 14.

“To both ensure we can offer students the opportunity to participate in education-based athletics but do so with their best interests in mind, we believe this modified plan offers a positive solution by addressing many of the concerns of our member schools,” said Jeff Cassella, president of the OHSAA Board of Directors and athletic administrator at Mentor High School. “Those that are able to start their seasons on time will be able to do so. Those that are starting later can still have a season. Add in the option of all schools entering the playoffs and the possibility of schools still being able to play 10 regular season contests, and this plan is helpful to virtually all of our schools.”

The highest number of responses to one of the questions posed of superintendents, principals and athletic administrators in a recent OHSAA membership survey indicated that nearly 60 percent (890 of 1,498 respondents) favored either reducing the regular season and maintaining full OHSAA tournaments or maintaining the full regular season and maintaining full OHSAA tournaments.

A decision on spectators at contact sports has not yet been made, however the OHSAA believes that at a minimum parents should be permitted to attend.

## Open schedule available for Petrarca Range

After taking time to properly assess safety measures for guests, the Civilian Marksmanship Program is ready to welcome the public back to Petrarca Range.

The range, located on the Camp Perry National Guard Training Site in Port Clinton, is open weekly and equipped with electronic targets designed to withstand both rifle and pistol firing.

For the foreseeable future, Petrarca will be available for use by appointment only, through one-hour time slots. Walk-ins will only be allowed if there is room in the given time slot, though walk-ins are not guaranteed time on the range.

Range hours will be Mondays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Petrarca is home to 10 rifle targets set up at 100 yards and five pistol targets set up at either 25 or 50 yards. For those interested in short-range zeroing, the targets can also accurately simulate 200, 300 and 600 yards.

Benches are available for those wishing to have extra support while firing.

Guests must provide his/her own equipment and ammo (no larger than .30-06 and no 300 Win Mag ammo or armor piercing ammo). Fees remain the same at \$10 per hour of shooting (or \$25 for 3 hours). 

## Nearly one-half century coaching

Former Eastwood and Bowling Green State University athlete and longtime Eastwood coach Mike Gardner is in his 49th season of coaching golf this year — one year away from a half century.

His golf teams have accumulated a 553-187 record, and in tournaments are an incredulous 2,671-1,772.

During his nearly half century run as golf coach, there have been 13 league championships, all in the Suburban Lakes League, four trips for the team to the state finals, and several individuals to the state finals.

Gardner was elected to the Ohio High School Golf Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1992. He won the prestigious Burt Silverman Memorial Award in 2016. He is the past president of the Northwest District Golf Coaches Association. Gardner presently serves on the Ohio High School Golf Coaches Association executive committee and serves as a rules official at the state golf tournament.

Gardner can be seen on a near-daily basis at Eastwood's home course, Tanglewood, in Dowling, cutting the greens and setting hole positions. He has continued to work there for 59 years as a greens keeper on the course and at times in the pro shop. His late father, Dallas, was a charter member at Tanglewood and a former Eastwood Schools superintendent who was also a three-sport standout athlete at Ashland University.

Mike was inducted into the Eastwood Alumni Association's Eagle Way Hall of Fame at a ceremony on Saturday, Feb. 22 at the Pemberville Post 183 American Legion Hall. But it wasn't just for his golf — it was for his overall career as an athlete and teacher.

Gardner holds the most varsity letters (13) in Eastwood history, was an Eastwood educator for 41 years, and for 34 years has been the Eastwood basketball scorekeeper. He is a 1968 graduate.

Athletically in high school, Gardner earned five varsity letters as a senior, participating in football, basketball, baseball, golf and track. He earned first team all-league in four sports as a senior.

Gardner was the quarterback on the 1966 football team, which was Eastwood's

first league champion in football, finishing 8-1 and taking the Northern Lakes League title. He was the point guard on the 1966-67 basketball team that finished 22-1. He had an earned run average well below 1.00 as a pitcher in his two years playing baseball.

As a senior, Gardner became the first golfer in school history to advance to the state tournament by shooting a 72 at the district tournament. Also, he was the first football player from Eastwood to be inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

At BGSU, he received his bachelor's degree in 1972 and his master's degree in 1978. He majored in health and physical education and minored in mathematics. Gardner went to BGSU on a baseball and academic scholarship.

"However, once he realized he 'couldn't hit a curveball and couldn't throw a fastball,' he tried out and joined the golf team for his junior and senior years," his Eastwood half of fame biography states.

The BGSU golf team was Mid-American Conference champions in 1972, his senior year. Gardner also was a starter on BGSU's freshman basketball team.

After graduation in 1972, Gardner landed a teaching position in the Eastwood School District. During his 41-year teaching career, he taught elementary physical education at Luckey, Lemoyne, Pemberville and Webster schools at one time or another with 2012-13 being his last year. He says his basic philosophy was to introduce many different activities to the students and have them realize that exercise and movement can be fun and rewarding.

Gardner was also Eastwood's junior high football coordinator for two years. He coached basketball for 38 years, including junior high girls and all levels of boys, including head varsity coach.

To stay active Gardner still enjoys running, exercising, golfing, bowling and shooting free throws. He has run in four marathons (Columbus, Washington D.C., Cincinnati and New York City). He finally shot his age in golf last summer as he fired a 67 at Tanglewood at age 69.

The other thing that has been a passion for Gardner over the years is attending his children's many activities. Now that continues to be enjoyable, but it's the next generation (grandchildren) that have kept him busy, Gardner says.

# Arquette leading the way

Clay tennis coach Walt Ralph is in his 47th season at the helm, covering boys and girls tennis over 24 years. He has been a head prep tennis coach nowhere else.

Last year, the Eagles were 10-8 overall and 3-4 in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference, but he has eight returning letter winners this year, bringing the team depth and experience.

In the TRAC, no public school has ever won a league championship in girls tennis. Notre Dame Academy has won five titles, Central Catholic three, and St. Ursula one, and Ralph says the league is "always tough."

In the final team standings, Clay finished fifth with 22 points, placing behind Notre Dame (38), Central (37), St. Ursula (37) and Findlay (23) and ahead of Fremont Ross (15), Whitmer (9) and Lima Senior (6).

Clay has qualified players to state, however, including two players who advanced in singles over the past two years. This year Ralph says his girls team has "some experience competing at a high level" after play-

ers qualified for districts last year.

Returning this year are first singles player Kenzie Arquette and the first doubles team of Macy Burgess and Lauren Mahler. Arquette was second team All-TRAC last year and Burgess-Mahler were honorable mention. Kenzie's sister, Mady Arquette, qualified for the Division I state meet in 2018 as a senior.

Ralph says Kenzie Arquette "has looked vastly improved during the pre-season" and another player, Allie LaPlante, is a junior likely to play third singles.

Arquette placed fifth in the TRAC first singles last year, defeating Ross' Vivyanna Esquivel 6-2, 6-4 in the second consolation final. Burgess placed fifth in second singles, defeating Ross' Alexis Huff 7-6 (6-3), 6-1 in the consolation final. Mahler was one-half of a doubles team that placed fifth in first doubles, defeating a Ross team, 6-3, 6-2. LaPlante was part of a doubles team that finished third in the league at second doubles, downing a St. Ursula team, 7-5, 6-1.






